Big Fire in St. Leuis.

A very disstrous fire occurred in St. Louis Monday evening. The mammoth seven story granite building at the southwest ogrner of Eights street and Washington avenue, occupied by the Ely-Walker Dry Goods Company, was completely gutted. The loss will be close to \$1,000,000. One human life was sacrificed and several people were hurt. The beilding belonged to to the estate of John R. Lionberger, formerly of Boonville, and was a very valuable piece of property. It was insured for \$200,000, and the stock for \$1,000,000. distributed among all the companies doing business in St. Lonis. The loss is considerably greater.
