Deaths.

—J. W. Artz, aged 64, died at his home six miles southwest of Boonville January 1, 1902. The funeral was held from the residence to Mt. Nebo church cemetery west of Bunceon. Deceased was a bachelor.

—Emma, the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Arnold, of Ninnekah, Indian Territory, died of diphtheria at that place last Thursday. The funeral and interment was held at Ninnekah, Saturday. Deceased and parents were former residents of Cooper county.

—Capt. J. M. Gentry died in St. Louis December 30. The remains were shipped to Louisiana, Mo., for interment. Deceased was the father of Mrs. Velt C. Eppstein of Boonville. Mr. and Mrs. Eppstein attended the funeral at Louisiana Tuesday.

—William R. Fowler, aged about 60, died at his home, two miles south of Clarks Fork, of paralysis Friday night January 3, 1902. The funeral was held from the residence to Hail Ridge cemetery Sunday afternoon. A widow and six children survive. Deceased was a member of the W. O. W. Lodge and held a policy for \$2,000 in the order.

—Miss Nannie T. Mills, aged 21, died at the home of her aunts, the Misses Edwards, on Sixth street in this city Sunday night. The funeral was held from the M. E. Church South to Walnut Grove cemetery Tuesday afternoon. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. O. G. Haliburton. Deceased was born in Boonville, May 16, 1881, and was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John R. Mills, deceased. Two sisters, Mrs. Atha Mitchell and Mrs. Edna Collin and three brothers, Carl, Leonard and Russell, survive. Deceased was an active member of the M. E. Church South and of the Epworth League.

—Joseph Combs, aged 82, died at his home in Kansas City, Kansas, Saturday, January 4. Deceased was born in Cooper county and was at one time prominent in political circles in the state. He left Cooper county for the state of California in 1849 and remained in that state until 1884, when he returned to Boonville and resided with his nephew Joseph L. Combs, two years. He went to Kansas City, Kansas, in 1886 where he has since resided. John Combs, who for a number of years resided in Boonville, being an artist by profession, was a son of deceased. John died in St. Louis three years ago.
