Death of Jacob M. Case.

On the evening of June 16, 1912, at the home of his brother, H. D. Case, there passed from this world to the great beyond, Jacob Miller Case aged a little more than 71 years. Mr. Case was born in Vermillion county, Ind., March 14, 1841. Besides his native state he lived for a time in lllinois and Wisconsin, the last 30 years were spent in Missouri. He was married to Mrs. Mary Robinson Feb. ruary, 1875. After 15 months of pappy married life his wife died leaving him with their only child,

During the Civil War Mr. Case was a soldier in the Union Army. He enlieted with Company C. of the Third Wisconsin Infantry in the beginning of the war. took part in the famous "battle above the cloude" on Lookout Mountain, fought in the desperate engagement at Chancellorsville, and helped to burl back Lee'e inrading forces in the awful battle of Gettysburg. He was in Sherman's "march to the sea " during which he was wounded and captured at Razaca, Ga., and confined in Lib by prison where he spent the clusing months of the war. He manifested great interest in the welfare of the surviving soldiers of the Confederacy. Recently be assisted one of them in gaining admission into the Confederate Home at Hig ginsville. "Uncle Jake," as he was familiarly called, was a gentleman in every sense worthy of the name. Jovial and courteous, cheerful and triendly, he was at once sincere and honest in all the relations of life, and his genial presence will ue sadly miesed by a large circle of friends. He did not belong to any church. To the writer he privately acknowledged a personal acceptance in Christ, and repeated ly expressed himself as cot being afraid to die. The funeral was conducted in the First Presbyterian church by the undersigned at one clack in the afternoon of June 18 interment was in the Odd Fellows Cemetery.
