Hurt, who was standing near at the time of the explosion, received slight burns also but not severe ones.

Benona W. Hurt was born in Cooper county on March 12, 1882, and was 33 years of age at the time of his sad death. He had atdended the public-schools and Kemper Military school: He lived all his life with his parents and devoted himself to the care of his father's extensive farm and stock interests. He was distinguished for filial affection unflagging industry even temper, claan life, devotion to friends and willingness to serve.
