PARALYSIS OF ENTIRE BODY CAUSES DEATH.

Vic Colins, Sr., Dies After Himess of Twenty-four Hours. Born in St. Leuis. Boonville Resident for Many Years.

TWO SONS SURVIVE FATHER

While playing with one of his grandchildren in his barber shop Monday evening about 8 o'clock, Vic Colin was suddenly and without warning stricken with partial paralysis of his body. The stroke effected only the left half of his body, until sometime the following day when his entire body became afflicted with the attack. About eight o'clock Tuesday evening, twenty-four hours after the first attack, he quietly passed away at his home on south Third street, which is occupied by his son, Vic Colin, Jr., and family, with whom Mr. Colin made his home after the death of his wife a few years ago.

Funeral services were held at the family residence Tuursday afternoon at two o'clock, conducted by Rev. Vivion, pastor of the Methodist church, and burial at Walnut Grove cemetery.

Mr. Colin had been in usual health when stricken with paralysis Monday evening. He was born in St. Louis September 29, 1849, and came to Boonville when a young man with his parents. He engaged in the barber business here forty-three years ago and followed that vocation continuously until his death.
