Mrs. McMahan will also be missed in the social life of Marshall, which for the past forty years has been the home of the family, except about 3 ½ years they lived at Donver, Colo., and the McMahan home has been a synonim of elegant hospitality during all these years.

The mother loved her friends and their companiship and hosts of warm friends and seighbors will miss her genial thappy disposition that scattered so much sunshine, not only in her own home but elsewhere in our city.

Mcs. Sarah E. McMuhan, who was 18 years old last December was the daughter of the late Freeman Wing, a prominent plouver citizen of Cooper county and was reared in that county. She was married to the late R, J. McMahan, November 1st. 1859, and Arrow Rock was the home of the family until 1880, as stated above.

The death of Mrs. McMahan is another community loss, for our city and the tears of many who sorrow on account of it are mingled with the deeply grieved daughters and sons.
