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Another good citizen who, with his family have been in close touch with the county and its interests for the past 33 years, has been called to his reward. John Judge died at his country home, 4 miles west of Shackelford, Monday, April 19th at 9:15 a. m. of acute indigestion. He had not been feeling well for the past week but was not confined to his bed. His illness did not become seridus until a few hours before his death. This well liked gentleman was born and reared in County Galway, Ireland, and was married to Miss Margarete Davis in 1879. Three years later he came to America. direct to Shackelford, Mo., and settled on a farm, later buying the present home place. The deceased was of a family of ten children, and one brother, Andrew Judge, and two sisters came to America. The wife and three sons, Berney of Saline, Patrick and John of Kansas City, and four daughters, Miss Mary and Sabina at home, Mrs. Joseph Youcum of Clifton City and Mrs. Pete Gramlich of Pleasant Green, survive.

Gental in disposition and kind to his fellow man, Mr. Judge was liked by a wide circle of relatives and friends. The world is better for such lives whose influence will live on through the years, blessing those whose lives were touched by his. Mr. Judge was a devout member of the Catholic church.

The funeral will be at the Catholic Church at Shackelford Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, conducted hy Father Jennings of Boonville, a cousin of the deceased. Burial will be at Mt. St. Mary's Cemetery at Shackelford.

Another worthy and faithful colored citizen, who has lived in Marshall for a great many years, Aunt Mary Haykins, passed away Monday, April 19, at 4 a. m. After being confined to her bed only a few days She was 76 years old and the greater part of her life had been spent in Saline and Marshall and in many of the homes in our city. She had been a faithful and valued helper. Her health had not been good for a loug time, but she was very persistent and energotic and managed to get out every day to the homes of those who had known her long and well and were always glad to receive any service she could render them. Three daughters survive the mother, Jennie of Marshall, Frederick Nora - and of Marshall Frederica Nattle of Kansas City.
