

Theodore Cartner of Near Speed Dies

Well Known Farmer Had Been
Ill Several Months—Funeral
Held Sunday

Theodore Cartner, 68 years old, a farmer of near Speed, died at his home at 5 o'clock Friday morning, Nov. 1, after having been in failing health for several months.

Theodore Cartner was born June 23, 1861, and was reared and spent his entire life on the farm near Mt. Hermon church. He was united in marriage to Miss Maria Rennison, Feb. 7, 1885, who, with two children, Mrs. Arthur Maddox, of Plisgah, and Elmer Cartner, of Boonville, survives. Three children died in infancy. Mr. Cartner is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. Fannie Ritchie, of the Speed community, and Mrs. Rachel Jackson, of Sedalla.

Funeral services were conducted at the home Sunday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock by Rev. Bomar of Tipton, followed by burial in the family cemetery near there.

Mr. Cartner was trustee of Mt. Hermon church at the time of his death, and was a member of the Odd Fellows Lodge.
