Mr. Mercer thinks that the fire was of incendiary origin, as he says there was no fire about the house or barn when he and Mrs.

Mercer left home Saturday after-

noon. The fire started in the barn.
Mr. Mercer, who is in very poor health, and Mrs. Mercer are temporarily making their home with their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Harris, in Boonville.
