DEMOCRATIC TICKET

Senator J. H. Gunn of Otterville has been one of the most conscientious members of the upper house in the Missouri General Assembly. As a banker in a small town he has come to learn intimately and first-hand the problems of the Missouri farmer and taxpayer. Always at the service of his constituents he has more than justified their votes which placed him in the legislature as the senator from the fourteenth district. On his record of service he is again seeking re-election. Cooper Countians, who are proud that he is a resident of their county and of Otterville, may well consider him.
