

# Wm. A. Smith 71, of Prairie Home Is Dead

Life Long and Useful Citi-  
zen of Cooper County  
Dies Saturday

SPENT MOST OF  
LIFE AS FARMER

Funeral Services For Father  
Of Mrs. Harold Mills  
Held Monday

William A. Smith, 71 years old, a highly respected and life-long citizen of the Prairie Home community died at his home north of Prairie Home Saturday morning following a lingering, painful illness. He was the seventh of a family of nine children of Jeremiah and Letitia (George) Smith and was born on April 24, 1860, on a farm near Prairie Home. He came of a sturdy pioneer stock, his grandfather, Thomas Smith having come to Missouri from Tennessee in 1817, a few years before Missouri became a state. In early life Mr. Smith was converted and joined the Cumberland Presbyterian church, afterward uniting with the Prairie Home Baptist church. He was a loyal, devoted member, serving the church conscientiously as its treasurer for many years, always found ready to do his part in every department of the church work, and faithful in his attendance unless prevented by illness.

On Nov. 29, 1883 he was married to Miss Bettie Murl of Bunceton who died less than a year ago. Two children were born to them, Mamie, now Mrs. Harold Mills of Boonville, and Elmer, who died in August, 1921. Beside the daughter there are four grandchildren, Mrs. Henry Graham, of Fayette; Jerome Mills of Boonville; Harry and Mildred Smith of Marseilles, Ill. He leaves also three sisters, Mrs. Alice Stissler of Denver, Colo.; Mrs. Mattie Franklin of Worland, Mo., and Mrs. Josie Koontz of Fulton and one brother, R. Boone Smith, of near Boonville.

Most of his life was spent on the farm near where he was born. In 1914 he moved to Prairie Home and some years later to the farm north of Prairie Home where he died. Mr. Smith was a good man, living his life quietly and con-

scientiously. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at three o'clock from the Prairie Home Baptist church, in charge of Rev. Loyal E. Brown, pastor assisted by Rev. H. C. Clark of Boonville and Rev. W. J. Snow. A male quartette, Rev. Brown, L. L. Williamson, Lewin Korsen, and N. D. Patrick, with Mrs. U. J. Logan at the piano, rendered some favorite songs, of Mr. Smith's pallbearers were Perry Duncan, Roger Q. Mills, Frank McDonald, U. G. Southerland, William J. Hurt, and H. L. Carpenter. Burial was made in the family lot at the Walnut Grove cemetery at Boonville.
