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Miss Ora Yarnell of Tipton Is Dead

Long Illness Fatal to Native of
Cooper County—Rites Held
Monday

Miss Ora Yarnell, who had been seriously ill for several weeks, died Sunday afternoon at 1:15 o'clock at the home of Miss Dora Cachet at Tipton, where she had been a semi-invalid for the last three years. Funeral services were held at the Christian church in Tipton Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock and burial was made in the Masonic cemetery. Six nephews were pallbearers: Vest and Charles Hirst, Hugh and Roscoe Yarnell, David and William Rowles. Miss Yarnell was born May 25, 1871, near Clarksburg, and moved to the Glendale community when she was a child. There she lived practically the rest of her life, with the exception of a few years in the states of Washington and California and the last few years in Tipton.

She is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Bessie Hirst, Glendale; Mrs. Vivian Fry, Mission Tex., and Mrs. William Spencer of Oklahoma City, Okla.; and by a brother, Clanton Yarnell, of Syracuse. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Yarnell, and a sister, Mrs. Alfred Rowles, died several years ago.
