William Albin Died Suddenly Sunday

Well-Known Lakota Man Was Victim of Heart Attack While Walking

William Albin, well known resident of the Lakota community, died Sunday while walking to Clarksburg to get his car which was being repaired there. His body was found on the road about half a mile from his home by Charlie Scott of near Pisgah. A coroner's jury rendered a verdict of death due to acute indigestion and heart failure.

Mr. Albin was the son of the late James Wigton Albin. He was born December 4, 1882, on the farm 4 miles north of Clarksburg where he lived practically all of his life and had owned for about 20 years.
