Man Hurt In Fall

From Freight Train

Clay Heady, 32 years old, of Oklahoma, a "free rider" on a Missouri Pacific freight train, fell off a westbound freight near Wooldridge about 9 p. m. Monday.

Heady was found this morning about 6 o'clock by residents of the community. Sheriff Arthur Bradley was called. A local doctor accompanied him and administered emergency treatment. The injured man was brought to St. Joseph's Hospital.

Examination revealed that he had suffered cuts and bruises, lacerations about the body and a sprained back. No bones were broken. His injuries are regarded as serious but probably will not prove fatal.

The man lay along the side of the track all night before help arrived. He said he was unemployed and mentioned no relatives. He said he was en route to Kansas City.
