Pilot Grove Elevator Secretary Dies At Home Of Daughter After Three Months' Illness

ELMER EMMETT WEAR DIES OF LONG ILLNESS

Former Resident Of Prairie Home Community Did Not Recover After Second Major Operation

Elmer Emmett Wear, former resident of the Pairie Home community died Sunday at Touro Infirmary, New Orleans, La., following a period of ill health which lasted about two years. He underwent a major operation in April, 1938, and a second after which he did not recover, ten days before his death. He was 65 years old.

Funeral services were held this afternoon at the Goodman & Boller chapel, conducted by the Rev. P. P. Taylor, pastor of the Nelson Memorial Methodist church. Burial was in Walnut Gove cemetery.

Mr. Wear was born east of Prairie Home Dec. 15, 1874, the son of Nim and Ophelia (George) Wear, pioneer Cooper County residents. When he was a few years old his parents moved to a farm one mile south of Prairie Home where he lived until about 19 years ago when he moved to Oxford, Miss., where he bought a farm. He and his family lived in the South since that time.

He married Miss Pansy Hemphill of Lawrence, Kas., on Jan. 25, 1915. Besides his widow he leaves their one child, Mrs. Ophelia Dourgoese of New Orleans, a brother, George H. Wear of Prairie Home; two nieces and three nephews. A twin brother, Clem, died at the age of 28.
