Mrs. Johanna M. Nelson

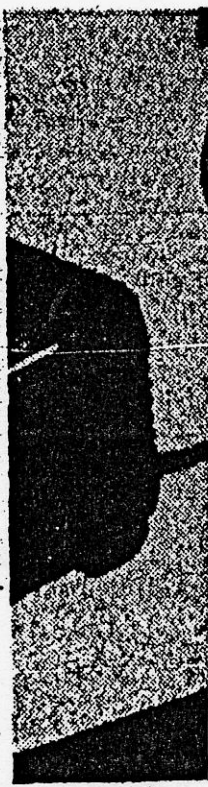
