Mr. Dale is the youngest mayor in the history of St. Joseph; youngest mayor of a first-class city in the United States, and the first Republican mayor of St. Joseph in 18 years. He was selected by the Junior Chamber of Commerce as the most outstanding young man of St. Joseph, and the
