## Hunting Accident Kills Glasgow Man

FAYETTE—Bryan Shifflett, 65,  
a farmer living approximately 10  
miles north of Glasgow, died Tues-  
day morning as the result of an  
accidental shooting, which occur-  
red while he was hunting on his  
farm.

Dr. W. A. Bloom, Howard coun-  
ty coroner who together with  
Sheriff Delgar Wells, investigated  
the incident, stated that Shif-  
flett's body was found by neigh-  
bors near a fence about noon. A  
.22 caliber-410 gauge rifle was  
found next to the body with the  
23 chamber empty. A bullet hole  
was located in the temple. Shif-  
flett's cap was caught in the  
barbed wire of the fence.

Dr. Bloom, termed the incident  
as accidental, indicating that he  
(Shifflett) had apparently leaned  
his gun against the fence on the  
opposite side and then crawled over  
the barbed wire, discharging  
the gun.
