was reported

good condition today after collapsing Wednesday while conferring with her attorney.

Jail attendants said the 36year-old Prairie Village, Kans. housewife and mother of four children, had eaten breakfast

and later conferred with her lawyer and a minister. Mrs. Haley called sheriff's officers Wednesday morning, reporting she had shot her husband, Dr.

Jack A. Haley, former Appleton,

Mo., physician. Officers quoted her

as saying the couple had been having domestic troubles for years and that the slaying climaxed a bitter quarrel. She was charged with first degree

murder. Hugh Kreamer, county attorney, said that although the woman had told him she shot her husband, she had not signed a statement.

Mrs. Haley told Kreamer she had obtained the automatic pistol, from which six shots were fired into the physicians body, at Boonville, and that the sheriff there souri's roads and highways.
