Doubt on Validity Of Dr. Haley Will

KANSAS CITY In-Johnson county, probate judge yesterday guestioned the validity of a hand-written will of the late Dr. Jack A. Haley who

was shot to death in the bedroom of his Prairie Village home July The will, dated February 8, 1962,

was written with a ballpoint pen on notebook paper. Part of it had been witnessed by

Haley's wife, Mrs. Dorís V. Haley, and by Haley's brother, Wendell E. Haley of Denver.

Mrs. Haley is charged in Johnson County District court with first-degree murder in connection with her husband's death.

Herbert W. Walton, probate judge, said there was a "serious

question" to the will's validity at the conclusion of a hearing on admitting the will to probate. Walton questioned an added page the document of instructions in written by Dr. Haley but not wit-
