A Lee's Summit man was injured fatally early yesterday when he was struck by a motor car as he crossed Raytown road toward his stalled motor car. His death was listed as the city's ninth traffic fatality of the year.

Police said Larry Lee Smith, 22 years old, of 1409 East Third street, was driving north on

Raytown road about 2 o'clock when his car stalled. He stopped the vehicle on the shoulder just north of Longview road.

A short time later, witnesses told the police, a southhound car stopped across the road, apparently to offer help. Smith crossed the road, talked to the driver and was crossing back to his own car when he was hit by a northbound car.

The driver of the northbound car, Robert F. Wolf, 40, an airman stationed at Richards-Gebaur Air Force base, told police the lights of the parked southbound car blinded him and he did not see Smith.

He estimated his speed at 40 miles an hour, the speed limit

The victim suffered head and internal injuries.

Mr. Smith was born in Grandview and was a lifelong area resident. He was graduated from Ruskin high school and worked for the Faultless Linen Supply & Uniform Rental company the last four years.
