ROBERT PECK, JR.

Robert McBride Peck, Jr., age 40, of Boonville, died Thursday night, June 3, 1976, following a short illness. Funeral arrangements are incomplete, but will be announced by the William Wood Funeral Home.

Mr. Peck was born in Boonville, May 6, 1936, the son of Robert M. Peck Sr. and Beth Shultice Peck. He married the former Donna Case, June 22, 1956 in Boonville. He was a graduate of the Boonville High School and attended Kemper Military School and Northeast State University at Kirksville.

He was employed in the family business at the Shultice Feed Company, and had also worked at the Missouri Training School for four years.

He was a member of the First Christian Church.

Surviving are his wife of the home; a son, Robert Gregory Peck, of the home; his mother, Beth Shultice Peck of Boonville; two sisters, Mrs. Lloyd (Mari Beth) Criss of Keota, Iowa, and Mrs. James (Linda Sue) Hampton, of Salvador, Brazil; four nieces and four nephews.

His father preceded him in death May 10, 1971.
