Quinonez, a wealthy businessman, said "I have no idea" why his family was targeted for the kidnapping.

But Theodore M. Gardner, specialagent in charge of the Washington FBI office, said that following the abduction Quinonez was contacted by phone and that a demand of \$1.5 million was made for his wife's release as a "war tax" Gardner said the abductors told Quinonez the money would be sent to lettist rebels in El Salvador

Gardner said that after the kidnapping Mrs Quinonez was brought by van to Washington and held at Carr's residence. He said federal agents had the residence under surveillance for several days.

Miami media were aware of the abduction early in the week, but were asked to keep the story from the public because of death threats to Mrs. Quinonez Joseph Corless . special agent in charge of the Miann FBI office credited journalists in

the safe rescue.
