




J.W. DUNCAN'S WHITE VALLEY FARM IN HOLT CO. MO.

## BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH OF WILLIAM A. PRICE.

A prominent grocery and produce merchant of Savannah, was one of the original settlers, locating in this county in 1837, pre-empting an eighty acre tract on the edge of the present site of Savannah. He was born on the 25th day of September, 1815, in Dutchess Co., New York. His early education was obtained at the common schools. He clerked in dry goods houses, in New York city for several years, and in 1837 left that city to make a home in the far West, resolved to first secure the land and then most likely devote his sole attention to agricultural pursuits. He crossed the Allegheny mountains by stage, thence down the Ohio river, up the Mississippi and Missouri to Liberty, Clay county, Missouri, thence on horseback to the Platte Purchase, locating

immediately near Savannah on his farm, where he lived as a farmer for about twenty years. In 1847 he sold his farm at fifty dollars per acre in gold, the best sale ever made in this county of land, and located in Savannah, where he immediately entered in the grocery and produce business. He has resided in that city since engaged in this business. He has never sought or held any public office except United States Collector for this district, for about one year during President Johnson's administration. He has been married twice—first in 1838 to Miss Elizabeth Earl, daughter of Jonathan Earl, one of the first original pioneers of this county, coming in 1836 from Kentucky. He lost his first wife about 1859, and was again married in 1861, to Miss Elizabeth Hob-

son, daughter of Stephen H. Hobson who settled in this county in 1842, coming from North Carolina. In politics Mr. Price is a Republican, was formerly a whig. During the civil war he was remarkable as a Union man. In religion, Mr. Price is not a member of any church, has always, however, been a respecter of religious creeds, and through life has been distinguished for temperate habits, sterling integrity of character, and public spirit. In social converse he is frank and agreeable, is, however, a man of marked decision of character. He was on the first grand jury of the Platte Purchase. His name figures conspicuously in the historical annals of this county. A fine portrait of him is found below.





BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH OF WILLIAM B. ALLEN.


A prominent citizen of Savannah, was one of the original pioneer settlers of the Platte Purchase. He came to the Platte Purchase in 1838, settling in Platte county, afterwards in 1843, about seven miles northeast of Savannah, on a farm of one hundred and ninety-four acres, which afterward, in 1848, he bought of John H. Meadow at five dollars an acre. This farm he assiduously worked till 1865, when he moved into Savannah. Mr. Allen was born on the 9th of May, 1822, in Callaway county in this State. His father, Bethel Allen, was a pioneer of

that county, where he settled in 1820,—coming from Smith county, Tennessee. Mr. Allen has through life been an agriculturist, but has several times held public office. He was elected County Assessor in 1865, and held it two years. He was again elected to this responsible office in 1872. In 1874 he was elected County Collector. He was married on the 27th of March, 1845, to Miss Isabella C. Beattie, native of Virginia, daughter of David Beattie, an early pioneer of Andrew county, where he settled in 1844, coming from Washington county, Va. In


politics Mr. Allen is a Republican, was a Democrat up to the war. During the civil war he was a marked Union man, and held at times the offices of Enrolling Officer and Deputy Provost Marshall of this county. In religion he is a Methodist. Mr. Allen has led a quiet life as a citizen of this county, has always been a man of temperate habits, integrity of character, and marked public spirit. His social style is pleasant, and without ostentation. A fine portrait of him is found above.




RESIDENCE OF A. SCHUSTER, SAVANNAH, MO.



FARM RES. OF JAS. H. CLARK, JACKSON TWP. 6 M. N.W. OF SAVANNAH, ANDREW CO. MO.






