Three Rebels Shot

On Sunday afternoon last, three rebels were shot, near Hunnewell, by a portion of Captain Barnes' Company M. S. M. The particulars, as far as we could learn, are as follows: A portion of Capt. Barnes' men, started from Salt River Bridge for the purpose of arresting three men. Arriving at the house where two of them resided, they were not found at home, but shortly made their appearance in company with two ladies, and the two men were arrested. Taking with them, these two individuals, the soldiers proceeded to the house of the third man, whom they found at home.

With the three prisoners they then started on their return, and on the way were fired on from the brush by a secret foe. As soon as the shots were heard the prisoners broke for the brush. They were immediately ordered to "halt" and not obeying the order they were immediately shot. One was instantly killed, the other lived but a few minutes, and the third one was left supposed to have been mortally wounded. The funeral of two of them took place yesterday. The names of the rebels killed were James Lasley, Joel Ridgeway and Jas. Price. — [Hannibal Herald.]

An Illinois Surgeon a Prisoner at Rich- mond.

The Jacksonville Journal states that Dr. David Prince, of that city, who was a brigade surgeon in the army of the Potomac, is, without doubt, a prisoner at Richmond. An unfinished letter written by him and sent by some other person, which was received by his family some days ago, left little doubt on the subject. But the Richmond Dispatch, received at Baltimore on the 12th, mentions his name among the prisoners, and also says that he was wounded.
