

**Citizen Passes Away**  
 A prominent citizen, who has been a member of the church for many years, passed away at his home yesterday morning at four-thirty o'clock. He had not been well for some months and about three weeks ago he fell and broke his thigh from which he never recovered. Mr. Bishop is born in Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania on Jan., 21st, 1824 and at the time of his death was 88 years old.

On Oct., 8, 1846 he was married to Miss Elizabeth Carnes to which union twelve children were born even of whom survive and are: F. M. Bishop of our city, W. C. Bishop of Kansas City, Sarah E. Baker who lives south of town, J. K. Bishop of Oklahoma, L. H. Bishop of New Mexico, Margaret Bohannon of Colorado Springs, Colo., and S. P. Bishop of Paw City, Okla.

In 1854 he came to Missouri where he lived for a number of years and then became a much respected citizen of our town. He was married to Miss Jennie Speyers on Feb., 20, 1878. It was in the year of 1873 that Union Church just south of town was built and very soon after he united with that church and when he came to our city put his membership in with the M. E. Church of which he has been a very devoted member every since.

On April 19, 1904 he was married to Mrs. C. A. Miller of Macon County who survives him. Uncle Jimmie was a good man, honest in all of his dealings and a thorough christian gentleman. He loved his fellowmen, his church and his God. One of the many good things we can say of him that up to his last sickness he always bowed before his Maker twice a day in family prayer and his favorite scripture was the thirty-first psalm.

Funeral arrangements had not been made at the time of our going to press.

The subject of this sketch, Lewis Gipson was born March 29, 1875, died Nov. 14, 1914 at 6 o'clock a. m. He was married Sept. 25, 1902 to Miss Lavinia Lee. This union was blessed with 5 children. One sweet little girl, Trevia, preceded him in death only 9 months ago. The four living children are Goldia, Ruby, Marian, and Rescoe. They with their loving mother have been privileged to minister unto him and try to cheer and comfort him through many months of suffering. He had been a constant sufferer of many months, but was always hopeful and patient.

He was ever loving and kind to his family and had a great desire to live with them, but God in his wise way knows best and we know He is too wise to make a mistake and too good to be unkind. His going away has caused many a tear of sorrow, but ah! there is one who alone can know her sorrow. She with her family have the sympathy of all in this their greatest sorrow.

Besides his wife and four children he leaves one sister, Mrs. Jettie Ann Warren. He made his home from the time he was 5 years old with Mrs. Ann Long who was all a mother could be to him. She also mourns her loss. The funeral was conducted on Sunday at 2 o'clock at Mt. Zion church by the Rev. V. O. White and his remains were laid to rest in the church yard there.

Former Resident Dies  
 Louis E. Hollander, born Feb. 25th, 1897 in Clarence, Mo. City Kansas, 1929 in Kansas City, Mo. Cerebral hemorrhage was the cause of death.

Mr. Hollander was sick just eleven days. He was the youngest son of William and Emma Hollander, both of whom died when he was about eight years old. He married Evelyn M. Williams of Kansas City, Mo., June 2nd, 1918. Of this union two children were born, William Clement, eight, and Robert Louis, six years old. He served in the world war in the navy, worked at the Burlington freight office in Kansas City about twelve years and in Clarence, Mo., some four or five years previous.
