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PRENTICE WOOD DIES OF BURNS

Trapped in Prairie Fire

Audrey Prentice Wood, 41, assistant fire chief at the La Junta, Colo., army air field, passed away at 2:00 o'clock Friday afternoon at the station hospital at the base, after having been severely burned when he was trapped in a prairie fire at the field March 22.

Three other fellows were also burned while fighting the grass fire which was a mile long and an eighth of a mile wide. Due to a sudden shift of the wind the fellows were trapped and were burned making their escape.

Brief services were held at five o'clock Saturday afternoon at the Peacock chapel at La Junta with Chaplain D. B. Jorgensen of the field officiating. The body was taken to Melbourne, Iowa, where funeral services were held yesterday afternoon. Interment was made at Melbourne, Iowa.

A son of Willie B. and Minnie Brewer Wood, he was born November 8, 1903 on a farm south of Clarence. In 1920 he went to Iowa where he was married to Miss Irene Vogt in 1930. During his 13 years spent in Iowa he was part time engaged in farming and for several years he served as a Standard Oil agent out of Melbourne. In 1942 he and his family moved to Colorado.

He was a member of the Masonic and Modern Woodman lodges of Melbourne.

Surviving besides his wife are three sons, Audrey Dale, Donald Dean and David Lee, his father, W. B. Wood, south of Clarence, two brothers, Roy B. Wood of Ogden, Utah, and W. Olin Wood, south of Clarence, and three sisters, Mrs. John H. Maupin and Mrs. Leroy Mahoney, south of Clarence and Mrs. Vesper Clarke, near Macon. Several nieces and nephews survive also.
