Funeral of Luther Lawrence Was Held Sunday at the Methodist Church 1929

After some six and one-half months of declining health Luther Lawrence, of west of Clarence, passed away at his home last Thursday.

He has resided in this community since 1918 when he purchased the farm home, where his death occurred. Since becoming citizens of the community, he and his esteemable family have gained the respect and admiration of a host of acquaintances.

Luther Lawrence, son of Jas. and Matilda Fidelia Lawrence, was born November 25, 1858 at Bushnell, Ill., being past seventy years of age at the time of his death. He was a member of a family of eight children, three of whom survive him, D. D. Lawrence, of Des Moines, Iowa; Mrs. Alice Olsson, of Corning, Iowa; and John W. Lawrence, of Linnville, Iowa.

He was married September 5, 1886 to Louisa Tice, at Pella, Iowa, and resided at his parental home in Iowa. They continued to reside in Iowa until the removal of the family to Shelby county, their present home.

The surviving members of his family are his wife, two daughters, Misses Lucy Isabel and Nancy Matilda, and one son, Harvey Tice. Their mother, survive.

Funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Methodist church by Rev. L. C. Maggart, and interment was made in Maplewood cemetery, the burial services being conducted by the Clarence Masonic Lodge of which he was a member.
