According to a report of the highway patrol, Coleman was driving his car east on highway 36 when the mishap occurred. The right wheels are reported to have left the pavement and when he attempted to get the car back in its traffic lane he lost control. The car careened across the highway and turned over at a point only a short distance west of the Macon-Shelby county line, pinning the driver underneath. He was taken to Samaritan hospital at Macon where he died about five hours later. Walker D. Brewington, 49, a passenger in the car was treated at Samaritan for minor injuries.

The body was taken to the home of the victim's parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Coleman, to await the funeral hour and services were held at the funeral home.

Mr. Coleman was born in Clarence on Nov. 23, 1927, and served in the European theatre during World War II. For several months he had been employed at Daniel's Skelly service station here.
