**Cecil Dungan, 52,  
Died Suddenly in  
St. Louis Friday**

Cecil Dungan, former Clarence resident, passed away on Friday, Jan. 16, while on duty as superintendent of the Medical Art building in St. Louis. Death came after only a few minutes of illness.

Mr. Dungan was born on April 15, 1900, at Hagers Grove, the son of Mrs. Rosa Wells Dungan of Clarence and the late Ellsworth Dungan. He attended school here, entered the armed services and served in the navy 18 months during the first World War and later spent 19 months in the army during World War II. His genial disposition won for him a legion of friends both here and later at St. Louis where he located soon after the first World War. He had been superintendent of the Medical Art building for 17 years. He was a member of the Christian church.

He was married on June 30, 1944, to Elizabeth Brooks who survives. Other survivors include his mother, Mrs. Rosa Dungan and his sister, Mrs. Bonnie Pippinger, both of Clarence. His father preceded him on Sept. 24, 1929, a brother F. Paul Dungan preceded him on Sept. 29, 1928 and a sister Fleta and brother Willie E. died in infancy.

Funeral services were held Monday, Jan. 19, at 10 a. m. from the Albert Hoppe funeral home on Washington Blvd. in St. Louis and interment followed in the National cemetery there. St. Louis Guard of Honor impressive services were held Sunday evening at 8 o'clock under the auspices of the Wellston Memorial Post, No. 154, the American Legion.
