

Died in Hospital Friday Night

Spencer Barr, 72, well known farmer of east of Clarence, passed away Friday night in Samaritan hospital at Macon. He entered the hospital Friday morning following an extended period of failing health.

He was born near Clarence on July 24, 1882, and spent his entire life in this community. On June 30, 1918, he was united in marriage to Miss Anna Bolling who survives with two children, Mrs. Robert Watkins of Kansas City and a son, Howard Barr of the home. Other survivors include two sisters, Miss Belle Barr and Mrs. Vincil Wheeler of Clarence, a brother, Oscar Barr of Clarence; two granddaughters and other relatives. Two brothers and two sisters preceded him.

The body was taken to the Greening Funeral Home and returned to the family home late Saturday evening where it rested until the funeral hour Monday. Last rites were held at 2 o'clock from Center Street Methodist church with the pastor, Rev. Milton M. Thorne, the officiant. Commitment prayers were read and interment made in Maplewood cemetery.
