**Died Suddenly at  
 Paris March 15**

L. A. Breedlove, 57, died of a heart attack at Paris on Thursday, March 15. He had been in failing health for several months but had been working some recently and had made a trip to Stoutsville and Perry. On the return trip he stopped at a service station in Paris where he died suddenly.

Lawrence Albert Breedlove was born on a farm near Pekin, Ill., on March 14, 1899, the son of Lawrence D. and Ida May Breedlove. He moved with his family to Clarence when he was ten years of age. He attended the public school in Illinois and graduated from the Clarence high school.

During World War I he joined the S.A.T.C. and attended Westminster college at Fulton. He was graduated from Gem City Business College at Quincy, Ill., in 1920. In the fall of the same year he was married to Ruth Watkins who survives.

Mr. Breedlove became a salesman and followed this line of work throughout his life. He sold insurance, traveled for Cudahy Packing Company and the Independent Baking Company. During this period Mr. and Mrs. Breedlove lived in Kirksville, Sedalia and Hannibal. Following this they returned to Clarence and Mr. Breedlove established his own business as a hearing aid dealer with Clarence as his home and the center of his business. He was a member of the Methodist church. Besides his wife, Mr. Breedlove is survived by one brother, Dr. R. M. Breedlove of Clarence, one niece, and four nephews.

He was preceded by his parents, sister, Mrs. Taylor Ashby, and a brother, Charles B. Breedlove.
