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Mrs. J. S. Watkins, Prominent Resident, Succumbs

Cora Knupp Watkins was born December 24, 1869 in Stiles, Davis County, Iowa. Her father was the Reverend Samuel Knupp, a Methodist minister and circuit rider in the early days of the Methodist Church in Southern Iowa and Northern Missouri. Her mother was Nancy Catherine Foshee. The father was a pastor in a number of communities in Northeastern Missouri, Lancaster, Glenwood, Carrollton, Clarence, Unionville and Kahoka.

Cora Knupp grew up in the atmosphere of the early Methodist Church in such communities. When the family moved to Clarence, where she attended the public schools, she met James Sigler Watkins. After completing the public schools in Clarence she attended a Methodist college at Glasgow, Missouri. Mr. Watkins attended the State Normal School at Kirksville, upon completion of the Clarence public schools. He received a diploma and teacher's certificate from the Normal School and taught school at Lentner. Later Mr. Watkins became owner and editor of one of the early newspapers in Clarence, "The Clarence Republican."

The Knupp family moved to the neighborhood of Lancaster and Glenwood, Missouri. Cora Knupp became a teacher in the school at Glenwood. One of her first grade pupils in the Glenwood school was Tom K. Smith, now Chairman of the Board of the Boatman's Bank in St. Louis.

Cora Knupp and James Sigler Watkins were married in Unionville, April 27, 1892. Two children were born of this union, Ralph Knupp Watkins and Catherine Ruth Watkins (now Mrs. Lawrence Breedlove). Soon after the birth of the daughter, Mr. Watkins became a railway postal clerk, working on through trains of the Burlington, but maintaining the family residence in Clarence. Mr. Watkins served as a railway mail clerk until his retirement when he became a householder.

Cora Knupp Watkins, having been reared in a minister's family, became an ardent church worker. Before her marriage she was an active assistant to her father in his pastoral duties. She also had a great interest in church music. Upon returning to Clarence after her marriage she became church organist and director of the choir. She was at the same time a faithful teacher in the Sunday School. Most of her earlier church service was rendered in the original Methodist Church in Clarence. This church was on the corner where the present Clarence High School now stands. This church was often called "the brick church" as it was, for a long time, the only brick church building in Clarence.

After the union of the Methodist churches, Mrs. Watkins taught a women's Sunday School class in the present church. She continued as a teacher and leader of this class as long as her health permitted. The Delta Alpha Class continues its organization and many of its members will remember Mrs. Watkins for her services.

Cora Watkins will be thought of by many members of the Clarence community as a mother and church woman. Her influence will last long after her generation has passed.

After the death of Mr. Watkins, Mrs. Watkins made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Lawrence Breedlove. The devotion of mother and daughter is well known by friends in Clarence.

On the twenty-eighth of September of this year, Mrs. Watkins fell and broke a hip. Since then she has been in the Boone County Hospital of Columbia. She had made promising recovery from the hip injury when she died suddenly from other causes on November 30.

Mrs. Watkins is survived by one sister, Mrs. B. B. Tatman of Scarsdale, New York; her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph K. Watkins of Columbia; and the daughter, Mrs. Lawrence Breedlove of Clarence.

She leaves three granddaughters, Mrs. Ray C. Baechle (Ruth Watkins) of Webster Groves; Mrs. Robert A. Mosenfelder (Clara Watkins) of Escanaba, Michigan; and Mrs. Joe J. Hanan (Julia Watkins) of Etna, New York. There are ten great-grandchildren.
