Mrs. Mabelle Taylor, 56, wife of the Rev. Perry P. Taylor formerly of Clarence, pastor of the First Methodist church of Chillicothe died at the Chillicothe hospital at 3:25 Saturday afternoon Aug. 11, following an illness of two months.

Funeral services were held at the First Methodist church at 11 a.m. Wednesday, conducted by the Rev. Ray S. Tomlin, executive secretary of the Board of Education of the Missouri Conference of the Methodist church and a classmate of Mr. Taylor at Central College, Fayette, Mo.

The body was removed from the Gordon Home for Funerals to the church at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning, where it lay in state until 10:45. The funeral party drove to Columbia, Wednesday afternoon where burial was made in Memorial Park cemetery under the direction of the Willett Funeral Home.

Mrs. Taylor was a member of the First Methodist church of Chillicothe and the Olive Prindle Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. She also belonged to the local chapter of the American Association of University Women and Sorosis. At the time of her death she was secretary of missionary study in the Women's Society of Christian Service of the First Methodist church.

Mabelle Keller was born April 24, 1895, at Palmyra, Mo., the daughter of Granville S. and Annie Whaley Keller. She attended Centenary Academy at Palmyra and graduated from Central College, Fayette, in 1916. She taught modern languages in the Fulton high school for a year. She was married to Mr. Taylor at Palmyra on August 29, 1917, to which union four children were born. During their married life Mr. Taylor has served as pastor in Chillicothe, Shelbina, Columbia, Liberty, Boonville and Richmond and has been district superintendent for the Methodist church in Chillicothe and at Kirksville.
