A message was received here Tuesday morning by Mrs. M. C. A. Powell, stating the death of her nephew, Clarence Powell, of Galesburg, who passed away Monday evening at 9:15 o'clock. He was injured while playing ball having a shoulder operation and an abscess formed and poison developed. He was the son of Asa D. Powell, known in Clarence and was 21 years of age. Besides the father he was survived by one sister, Miss Ruth, Kansas City, and a number of relatives. His mother preceded in death a number of years ago. He was employed as stenographer in Galesburg, Ill. A. Powell, of Kansas City, will be the funeral.

Returning to Missouri in 1903, they located in Clarence, where Mr. Ward became interested in business affairs.

Two children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Ward but both of them died in infancy. Of the immediate relatives of the deceased but two survive, a sister, Mrs. Emma Asbury, and a brother, Sam Long of Clarence.

Mrs. Ward was a member of the Baptist church and the funeral will be held at that church this afternoon at two o'clock, conducted by Rev. W. B. Allsberry. Interment in Maplewood cemetery.
