

HUGH WHEELER DIED FRIDAY

Former Shelby Countyman Passed Away at his Home in Elwood, Kansas.

Hugh Brent Wheeler, was born in Shelby county, Missouri, Sept. 1, 1867 and departed this life at 10:30 a. m. Friday, September 23, 1932 at his home in Elwood, Kansas, at the age of 65 years and 22 days. He united with the Methodist Episcopal church south when he was a very young man. His early life was spent in teaching school and later depended wholly upon farming as a livelihood. With the exception of four years spent in Colorado, Mr. Wheeler lived in Shelby county, until 1917 when he moved with his family to Elwood, Kansas.

He was married to Miss Milza Edwards, September 17, 1890, and to this union five children were born, three of whom preceded him in death. Two daughters, Jewel and Hazel, died in October, 1898, at the ages of seven and two respectively. A son, Prince, passed away January 10, 1919, at the age of 16 years. Mr. Wheeler is survived by his wife, two daughters, Mrs. A. R. Smith, Marceline, Mo., Mrs. A. G. Marselius, Elwood, Kansas; two sisters, Miss Ethel Wheeler and Mrs. J. R. Edward Hummer, Injured in Wreck, Died Wednesday, 1932

William Ewerd Hummer, who was so seriously injured in the automobile collision at Mills' corner last Saturday, January 10, died at his home Wednesday morning. He never regained consciousness after receiving the injuries. He was born November 12, 1910 near Newark, and at the age of nine years moved with his mother to Elwood where he resided until his death January 14, 1931 at the age of 20 years, two months and two days.

Funeral services for Charles Wesley Waters, 28, proprietor of a Salt Lake City, Utah, cafe, who was fatally injured in a motorcycle wreck Friday, August 18, were held at the Moose club in Salt Lake City at 12:00 o'clock Tuesday, August 22. Interment was in the Salt Lake City cemetery.

The crew of the train was unaware of the accident and the victim was not found until 5:00 a. m. When a passer-by discovered the mutilated body in between the railroad tracks. The train was traveling between the sixteenth and seventeenth cars of a northbound 18-car train at Eighth West street. Traffic Investigator F. Clark Sanford of the Salt Lake City police department said the left leg was badly mangled, the right leg severed. He apparently had not been injured above the waist. Officer Sanford said the motorcycle evidently had been traveling at "a fairly high speed," since 140 feet of brake marks were discovered. The train crossed the intersection at an angle running from southwest to northeast, he reported.

Funeral services were held Monday morning at 11 o'clock at the Methodist church conducted by Rev. McElroy, assisted by Rev. Wm. Rutherford. Interment was made in Maplewood cemetery at 2 a. m., according to reports received by The Salt Lake Telegram. Cause employees explained that he chose the motorcycle instead of his automobile because he would be "cooled off sooner" after working in the heat of the kitchen. Chief Traffic Deputy J. E.
