

Sudden Death of Mrs. Hugo Boling, Sr.

William C. Sherwood, son of John W. and Frances Sherwood, this community was shocked to learn of the sudden death of Mrs. Hugo Boling, Sr., prominent woman of this vicinity, which occurred Saturday night a few hours after suffering a paralytic stroke.

Mrs. Boling was at work in the poultry yard when she was struck in 1919, at first residing for a short time at Shelbyville, where on Sept. 26, 1919, he was united in marriage to Ethel Orr. From Shelbyville he and his wife moved to Shelbyville and a short time later to Enterprise where he entered the general mercantile business. In August, 1936 he moved with his family to Green City, Mo.

Mr. Sherwood is the father of three children, Carolyn, Elizabeth and Richard. His wife and the heavy rainfall. Death followed soon after.

Magdalena Bletzinger, daughter of Fredric and Rosema Bletzinger, was born January 9, 1866 in Kupferzell, Wurttemberg, Germany, and departed this life March 11, 1939 at her home southeast of Clarence.

She came to America alone at the tender age of fourteen years with a ticket from her home in Germany direct to Clarence.

She was married to Hugo Boling November 30, 1884 and they went to housekeeping on the farm where she died. To this union four children were born, namely Fred, Hugo, Jr., Mrs. Mary Smith of the home vicinity and Lee who passed away June 18, 1936. At an early age she was coming to the Lutheran church. After coming to America she united with the Lutheran church and remained a loyal member to the last. She was a loving wife and mother and a good neighbor, always ready to lend a helping hand to anyone in sickness or trouble. She will be sadly missed in her home and community.

William Frank Hubble, for many years a resident of the farm vicinity northwest of Clarence, passed away at 5:10 p. m. Wednesday, October 25, after undergoing an operation on Tuesday morning.

A son of John A. and Harriett M. Hubble, he was born in Macon county, Mo., near Ten Mile on July 31, 1861, being at the time of his death 78 years, 2 months and 24 days of age. He was the oldest of a family of nine children, five boys and four girls.

In 1882 he was united in marriage to Miss Ella Maddox. To this union were born two children, a son, William Austin and Chalmers Hubble. He was preceded in death by his wife and two children several years ago, also by his father and mother and three brothers, Charles, T. James H., and an infant brother, Arthur.

He later married Mrs. Fannie Lydy who survives with her five children by a former marriage. He also leaves four sisters and one brother, Mrs. Eva Honnaker of Clarence, Mrs. Ella Art of Perry, Mrs. Lillie Keel of Clarence, Mrs. Bertha Huet of Aabel and I. J. Hubble of Clarence; two grand-children, Mrs. Theo James of Clarence and Arden Hubble of St. Louis; three great grandchildren and a host of sympathizing friends.

Soon after his first marriage Mr. Hubble located on a farm nine miles northwest of Clarence, in Macon county, near his birthplace, where he engaged in farming and raising thoroughbred Shorthorn cattle. He resided on this farm until four years ago when he moved to Huntsville. He had lived in Moberly since last spring.

Funeral services were held at the church at 2:00 p. m. Friday afternoon.

James C. Noel, 65, prominent Clarence resident, passed away at his home here at 3:45 a. m. Thursday, October 26, ten months and two days after suffering a stroke of paralysis.

A son of E. P. and Hannah Oglesby Noel, he was born September 9, 1874, in Lewis county, near Newark. When he was one year old his parents moved to a farm south of Clarence where, for a number of years, Mr. Noel was a leading farmer and stock buyer.

In 1927 he retired and moved with his family to Clarence. About two years later he became associated with his son, V. L. Noel, in the oil station business, in which he was engaged until December 24 when a paralytic stroke confined him to his bed.

He was a member of the Woodman and Odd Fellows lodges. On March 4, 1896, he was married to Florence Gishwald, who survives with their six children, namely: V. L. Noel of Clarence, H. J. Noel of Springfield, Mo., W. Noel of Denver, Colo., Les Noel of Noel of Hartington, Texas, John W. Retired Clarence Farmer Buried Saturday, 1939

Alexander Esom Farris, 75, retired farmer, passed away at 6:50 p. m. Thursday, November 2, at Moberly at the home of a step-daughter, Mrs. Tessie Hathenman. About two weeks ago he entered the McCormick hospital at Moberly for treatment, and a week later was removed to the home of his step-daughter, where his death occurred. He had been in declining health for the past year, during which time he had resided with his daughter, Mrs. Perry Gingsrich, north of Clarence.

The eldest son of John and Darcia Jane Farris, he was born in Monroe county, Mo., February 12, 1864, near Woodlawn. On May 23, 1896, he was married to Martha Re Eitta Lester, who preceded him in death on March 24, 1902.

To this union three children were born, a son, Chester James, now of Tulsa, Okla., and two daughters, Mrs. Opal Gingsrich of near Clarence, Mo., and Mrs. Audrey Porter of near Moberly.

He was later married to Mrs. Elva Pollard and to them two daughters were born, Jessie Pearl, who preceded him in death on April 30, 1937, and Letta Mae, at home.

Frank Dimmitt Succumbs

Frank Dimmitt, 81, retired Shelby county banker and former Shelbyville mayor, passed away at his home in Shelbyville at 6:30 o'clock Monday morning. Death was caused from a paralytic stroke suffered about a week ago.

The son of Dr. Philip T. and Frances Agee Dimmitt, he was born December 2, 1857 near Booneville. When he was three years old, the family moved to Shelbyville where he was reared and received his education. Following his graduation from the Shelbyville High school in 1874, he taught four years in the Epworth and Duncan rural schools.

Mr. Dimmitt's career as a Shelby county banker was begun in a banking house organized at Shelbyville by his father and a friend, Mr. Cooper. He was later associated with John D. Ransdall in the Farmers and Merchants Bank in Monroe City.

At one time he operated a dry goods and clothing business in Clarence in partnership with his brother, Marvin. Six years later he returned to Shelbyville where he held the office of county treasurer from 1888 to 1890 and that of circuit clerk and recorder from 1890 to 1898.

In 1898 he moved to Shelbyville where he became president of the Shelbyville Old Bank Trust Co., a position in which he continued except for a few years spent in St. Louis as farm inspector for the Federal Land Bank, until his retirement about fifteen years ago. Dimmitt served as mayor of Shelbyville from 1924 to 1932. He was a member of the Shelbyville Methodist church and the I. O. O. F. and K. P. lodges.

He is survived by his wife, Emma Jackson Dimmitt, and two children, Mrs. Clara Shelton, Jefferson City, Dr. Frank Ellison Dimmitt, Boston, Mass., and three grandchildren. One son and one daughter preceded him in death.

Also are surviving are two brothers, Prince Dimmitt, Shelbyville and Pope Dimmitt, San Antonio, Texas.

Funeral services will be conducted from the Methodist church at 2:00 o'clock with the Rev. H. W. Eisenberg officiating.

John Minick Dies in Shelbyna Hospital

John Minick, 82, passed away at 8:30 o'clock Tuesday morning at the Furnish hospital at Shelbyville where he had been a patient since Thursday. He had been ill for the past month.

One of nine children, Mr. Minick was born in Cedar county, in the southwest part of Missouri, on February 5, 1857. In his early childhood he moved with his parents, William and Caroline Morton Minick, to the Clarence vicinity. He lived on a farm northeast of Clarence until about thirty years ago when he moved to a location south of town, where he had since resided.

He was married to Mollie Robins, son, who preceded him in death. To this union four children were born, two of whom survive, Mrs. Jesse Carothers of Shelbyville, and Forrest E. Minick of Moline, Ill. He also leaves one brother, Isaac Minick of this city; two sisters, Mrs. Calthe Tharpe of near Shelbyville and Mrs. Cora Taylor of Hannibal; five grandchildren and a host of friends.

He was a member of the Clarence Methodist church, which he served devotedly for many years. Funeral services will be held at the Million-Barkeley Funeral Chapel here at 2:00 o'clock this afternoon (Wednesday) conducted by the Rev. Elba Martin, assisted by the Rev. J. A. Sneed. Interment will be at Bacon Chapel.
