

JAMES B. RAY

James B. Ray, 94, massed away at his home Thursday afternoon at three o'clock following an illness of fourteen months. In May, 1941 he suffered a stroke of paralysis from which he never receivered.

For several years Mr. Ray has held the distinction of being the only Civil War veteran living in Clarence.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday afternoon at three o'clock at the Bapy'st church where he held his membership. Rev. Geo. W. Lamken officiated. Burial was in the Maplewood cemetery. Members of Clarence Memorial Post No. 399, marched in a body from the church to the cemetery where they held graveside military services. On behalf of the American Legion, the United States flag that had draped the casket was presented to Mr. Ray's daughter, Mrs. Wm. Stinson. Born October 19, 1847 in Miami,

Butler county, Ohio, he was the son of David and Martha Ray. At the age of five years his family moved to Mt. Sterling, Ill. When only 17 years old he enlisted in the Juston Army and served during the remainder of the war Spoot after adjusting he was nestroed Louis 18th Illunia Infantry Co. B, his company taking part in General Sherman's march to the sea. In November, 1865 he received his discharge. The following month he came to Missouri and became interested in farming

On August 15, 1871 he was married to Miss Melissa Clutter, who preceded him in death October 8, 1939. Nine children were born to this union, two of whom died in infancy. Those surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Wm. Stinson, of Clarence and Mrs. J. H. Clark, of Hannibal, five sons, Ruffa, Lewis and Lonnie Ray, all of the home, Eugene and Elmer Ray, of Omeha, Nebr., 16 grandchildren and 20 great grandchildren.
