The former Miss Koftan was married recently to Lou Walta, also of Howard in a ceremony performed in St. Mary's Catholic church there.

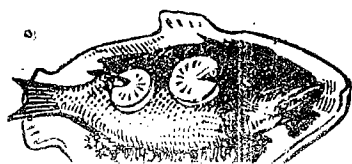
For her wedding the bride was attired in a white dress fashioned of Japanese silk sent her from Japan by her brother, Pfc. Leroy Koftan.
