

Soldiers Of Aug Mexican War 1965

The following is a list of Mexican War veterans as listed by the Historical Society and sent to this office by R. T. Neff:

James R. Creel, Thomas S. Dunbar, Peter P. Davis, W. R. Strachan, Gen. McNeal's Prove Marshall.

Company left Palmyra June 20, 1846, to Leavenworth, Kansas, then to New Mexico. In the assault of Moro in 1847. Also guard and garrison duty around Las Vegas, Santa Fe and Haos. Mustered out in fall of 1847. This information from the Shelbina Democrat Centennial Edition, July 31, 1935, in library.

Barker, George W., Pvt. Co. I, 2nd Mo. Vol. Willick's Extra Battalion; James S. Barker, Co. K., 1st Texas Cavalry, Shelbina Cem.; Benjamin Perry, Co. D., 2nd Kentucky Inf., Oak Dale Cem.; Brown, Wm. H., Pvt., Co. I., 2nd Mo. Vol., Willick's Extra Battalion; James A. Carothers, Lt., Co. I., 2nd Mo. Vol., Willick's Battalion; Robert Clark, Co. I., 2nd Mo. Vol., Willick's Extra Battalion, died at Las Vegas, Feb. 23, 1847; John Thomas Fitzpatrick, 1822 - 1901, Pvt. Mexican War, buried at Crooked Creek Church, Monroe County; James Parker, Co. I., 2nd Mo. Vol., Willick's Extra Battalion,

mustered out in fall of 1847 at Leavenworth, Kansas.

William R. Vannoy, born in Marion County, Mo., May 3, 1829, left a wife and three children to make it the hard way, died of T. B. April 16, 1882; William Thompson, Co. K., 3rd M. T. D., Vol., born May 11, 1822, died April 15, 1907, buried in Godfrey Cemetery at Hunnewell; Ed Barr, son of John Barr of Shelbina, Co. G., 5th Missouri Regiment, returned from Chickamauga with malaria fever, information Shelbina Democrat Cent. Ed., July 31, 1935, in library; Sanford Baker, reported by Austin Claggett; Johnson S. Cravens, Sgt., Co. E., 7th U. S. Vol. Inf., Shelbina IOOF Cem.; Phil Dimmitt, name mentioned as being a soldier in the war; Samuel Donaldson, 3rd U. S. Cavalry, stationed at Tampa, Florida; Henry A. Farmer, 1872-1949, Pvt. in Mo. 3rd Cav., Shelbina IOOF Cem.; Howard Holmes, name mentioned as being soldier in the war; Charles W. Jacobus, 1873-1942, from plot book, Shelbina IOOF Cem.

George Madison, fought in the Spanish American War, enlisted from Shelby Co., presumed he died in the Philippines after the war. Never heard from again; Charles Snell, name mentioned as being a soldier; Jesse T. Wood, died 1900, buried in Bacon Chapel Cemetery; Mark Smith, thought to be the only Shelbina man to serve in the war, son of Dr. J. D. Smith; Charles Tyner, 5th Regt., under Moore, son of Wm. Tyner, Shelbyville; William David Timmons, buried in Arlington National Cemetery, grave no. 18723.

PHILIPPINE INSURRECTION, 1904: Richard O'Donnell, served in the police force at Manilla, was a soldier 3 yrs., buried in Shelbyville IOOF Cem.
