

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REYNOLDS FAMILY

The family history begins with my earliest known ancestor in England and follows a record beginning with CHRISTOPHER REYNOLDS and progressing onward to my immediate family. The following information on the first six generations and part of the seventh generation has been copied from the book "REYNOLDS FAMILY" - 1530 - 1959, by S. F. Tillman who spent more than 30 years compiling the Reynolds genealogical record. Research was made in U. S. Census Returns, Family Bibles, other published works, etc.

"The name Reynolds, also spelled in America as Runnels, Runals, etc., is of Norman origin, and comes from the family of Renard. The family is of great antiquity, claiming descent from Reynolds son of Grethferth - The Dane - King of Northumberland. Grethferth and his two sons were driven from England circa 944 and took shelter in Normandy. His descendants Fitzreynolds - meaning son of returned to England with William The Conqueror."

He was educated at Cambridge University and received the King's Bounty for Virginia on August 18, 1718. From 1718 until 1726, he was Missionary of the Society for the Propogation of the Gospel at Marble Head, Massachusetts.

He came to Virginia in 1726 and was directed to the Parish of St. Peter's by Robert Carter, who at the time was Acting Governor, and from whom Mr. Mossom carried a letter of introduction to the Vestry. He was received as Minister and served the Parish until his death in 1767.

The Tablet to the Memory of Rev. Mr. David Mossom has been replaced on the wall of the Restored St. Peter's Church and the legend recorded by Bishop Meade is now barely legible.

Parson Mossom has been represented as an eccentric individual; he was married four times. His niche in the History of our Country has been awarded him because he was the Minister who officiated at the wedding of George Washington and Martha Dandridge Custis on January 6, 1759, in St. Peter's Parish, New Kent County.

His first wife was Elizabeth, who died in St. Peter's Parish, and was buried in the Churchyard, where her gravestone now stands close to the east wall. She died January 28, 1738.

By Elizabeth, he had David, born Sunday, August 21st and was baptized Sunday, September 1715. Robert, 3rd son, born December 1st, Sunday, 16, 1716. He died September 26, 1717, and was buried at St. Margaret's Churchyard. Susuanna, daughter, born July 22, and baptized July 31, 1720. Thomas born 1719 died March 21, 1739. Elizabeth, another daughter, born September 21st and baptized 30, 1722. Elizabeth born 1724 and died December 24, 1754.

Issue of the last by Elizabeth his wife: Joseph, born October 8, 1725; Richard, born November 28, 1727. David Mossom (see Quarterly, IV., p. 66) became minister of St. Peter's Church in 1727. There is proof that he was married three times. Bishop Heads says he was married four times. He was the person who officiated at the naptials of George Washington, and continued in the ministry 40 years. According to his epitaph he was educated at St. John's College, Cambridge, and was the first native American admitted to the office of presbyter in the Church of England. In his autobiography the Rev. Deveroux Jarratt attributes a poor character to morals and religion in New Kent. But it is so much essier to overdraw than to give an exact representation. Jarratt says that Mosem was a poor preacher, very near-sighted, and, reading his sermons closely, kept his eyes fixed on the paper, and his remarks "seemed rather addressed to the cushion than to the congregation." As illustrative of the lifeles condition of religion, he mentions a quarrel between Mr. Mossom and his derk in which the former assailed the latter from the pulpit in his sermon. and the latter, to avenge himself, gave out from the deak the psalm in which were those lines:

"With resiless and ungoverned rage, Why do the besthen storm? Why in such rash attempts engage As they can ne'er perform?"

His daughter Elizabeth married Capt. William Reynolds.

Wm. Chamberlayne made his will Oct. 1, 1735, and had by Elizabeth, his wife, Edward Pye, Richard, Thomas, Mary, Elizabeth, Frances, Anne, and Anne Kidley. The widow married William Gray, of New Kent. (Hening, V., p. 117.) Of these, Richard had by Mary, his wife, Edward Pye, born January, 1768. Thomas married Wilhelmina, daughter of William Byrd and Lucy Parke. (Hening, VI., p. 319.)

The following entries are from an old Bible in the possession of Mrs. Mildred Spotswood Mathes, of Memphis, Tenn. This Bible was printed by "Thomas Baskett, printer to the king's most excellent majesty, 1751."

"Nathaniel West Dandridge, married to Dorothea Spotswood, June 18, 1747.

"Martha Dandridge, born September 20, 1748.

Capt. William Reynolds married Elizabeth Mossom - b. 30 Sept 1722. Her father was Rev. David Mossom and mother Elizabeth who died 28 Jan 1738 and is buried in St. Peters Parish Church Cem, Kent Co. Va.

MOSSOM, REV. DAVID, son of Thomas Mossom, chandler, was born at Greenwich, Kent, England, March 25, 1690, schooled at Lewisham, admitted sizar at St. John's College, Cambridge, June 5, 1705. He became rector of St. Peters Church, New Kent county, Virginia, in 1727, and continued forty years. On January 6, 1759, he performed the marriage of George Washington to Martha Custis, widow of Colonel Daniel Parke Custis, and daughter of Colonel John Dandridge. He died January 4, 1767, leaving issue.

think they have no just claim to that character, as the ringleaders of the party were, for their erroneous doctrines and practices, excluded the Presbyterian Synod of Philadelphia in May, 1741, (as appears by an address of said Synod to our Governor;) nor have they, since that time, made any recautation of their errors, nor been readmitted as members of that Synod,—which Synod, though of many years' standing, never was reprehended for errors in doctrine, discipline, or government, either by the established Kirk of Scotland, the Presbyterian Dissenters in England, or any other body of Presbyterians whatsoever. Whence we beg leave to conclude, that the distinguishing tenets of these teachers before menioned are of dangerous consequence to religion in general, and that the authors and propagators thereof are deservedly stigmatized with a name (New-Lights) unknown till of late in this part of the world.

"That your petitioners further humbly conceive that, though these excluded members of the Synod of Philadelphia were really Presbyterians, or of any of the other sects tolerated in England, yet there is no law in this Colony by virtue whereof they can be entitled to a license to preach, far less to send forth their emissaries, or to travel themselves over several counties, (to many places without invitation,) to gain proselytes to their way; 'to inveigle ignorant and unwary people with their sophistry;' and, under pretence of greater degrees of piety among them than can be found among the members of the Established Church, to seduce them from their lawful teachers and the religion hitherto professed in this Dominion.

"Your petitioners therefore, confiding in the wisdom and piety of this worshipful House, the guardians of their religious as well as civil privileges, and being deeply sensible of the inestimable value of the souls committed to their charge, of the infectious and pernicious tendency, nature, and consequences of heresy and schism, and of the sacred and solemn obligations they are under 'To be ready with all faithful diligence to banish and drive away all erroneous and strange doctrines contrary to God's word, and to use their utmost care that the flock of Christ may be fed with the sincere milk of the word only,' humbly pray that the good laws, formerly in that case made and provided, may be strictly put in execution; particularly that entitled 'ministers to be inducted.' And, as we humbly think this law still retains its primitive force and vigour, so we pray that it may on this occasion effectually exert the same, to the end that all novel notions and perplexing, uncertain doctrines and speculations, which tend to the subversion of true religion, designed by its admirable Author to direct the faith and practice of reasonable creatures, may be suitably checked and discouraged. And that this Church, of which we are members, and which our forefathers justly esteemed a most invaluable blessing, worthy by all prudent and honourable means to be defended and supported, being by us in the same manner regarded, may remain 'the pillar and ground of truth,' and glory of this Colony, which hitherto hath been remarkably happy for uniformity of religion.

The Wedding Of Martha And George Washington

Martha Dandridge Custis and George Washington were married on January 6, 1759 in an early afternoon ceremony performed by the <u>Reverend David Mossom</u>, rector of St. Peter's Church (Episcopal). The nuptials took place at the bride's home, White House Plantation, New Kent County, Virginia. A reception followed immediately.

That announcement sums up the most basic facts. But this couple has particular significance in the development of the United States. Much more information is appropriate.

Yet biographers have tended to be quite sketchy about how the couple met and what kind of a wedding ceremony it was.

So it is the purpose of this article to present a fuller description of the union of these two individuals who shared more than 40 years of life as husband and wife and whose lives have become a lasting and cherished part of our heritage.

On their wedding day, Martha Custis was age 27½ and George Washington would be 27 about six weeks later. It was his first marriage. Martha had been married once before.

Her first husband, Daniel Parke Custis, died on July 8, 1757 at age 45 years, 9 months. They had been married eight years and had four children. The first and second born (Daniel Parke Custis and Frances Custis) died in infancy. John Parke Custis ("Jackie") and Martha Parke Custis ("Patsy") survived. Jackie was age four and Patsy age two when their mother re-married. Tragically both had short lives—hers ended at age 18, his at age 27. As it developed, Jackie and Patsy were the only children

George and Martha Washington were to enjoy and raise. No children were born during their 40 years of marriage.

Most biographers say that it is probable that George Washington had met Martha Custis at various social events before she was widowed. The two were known to have attended some of the same dances and parties and it is a reasonable assumption they would have been introduced. However, no substantial proof has come to light to satisfy biographers that they did actually meet until approximately eight months after her husband died.

George and Martha were together on March 16, 1758. Whether they had been introduced before that date or not, this meeting was the first at which they spent any significant amount of time in each other's company, particularly as two "eligible" individuals. Martha was a guest at the home of her neighbor, William Chamberlayne, and George was enroute to Williamsburg. When his boat docked in New Kent, Mr. Chamberlayne invited George to dinner. He accepted, was formally introduced to Martha and apparently was seated next to her at the table

The mutual interest and attraction was immediate. George cancelled his plans to continue on to Williamsburg that same day. This caused some disruption to those travelling with George, and was a highly irregular thing for him to do. He stayed overnight at Chamberlayne's and on into the late afternoon the following day.

A short time later, on March 25, George called upon Martha at her own home. This required a courtship trip of 33 miles on horseback from Williamsburg. Virtually all biographers say that George Washington proposed marriage to Martha Custis on March 25, 1758 at her home. And even the most cautious and careful writers conclude that either (a) Martha accepted the proposal on that same day, or (b) she gave George definite assurance that she would give his proposal prompt consideration.

By modern standards, it sounds ludicrous to suggest that these two people would come to such a major understanding on their second meeting. However, several authors point out: (1) at that time men and women of marrying age were typically extremely fast in making and accepting proposals, and (2) even if George Washington and Martha Custis had met each other only very recently. it is a virtual certainty that each knew a great deal about the other by reputation in this small geographical area and being in the same social circles. George had built a fine reputation as a Colonel in the Indian Wars, as a leader in Virginia politics, as a substantial farmer in Fairfax County, and as a most eligible bachelor in the social life of Williamsburg. Martha was generally considered one of the prettiest and wealthiest widows in Virginia and a popular, much sought-after guest and companion in Williamsburg's society.

Most observers assert that it was a mutually prudent and sensible engagement. It would be a marriage of convenience: Martha bringing into it an inherited fortune (over 17,400 acres of real estate plus £23,632—\$600,000 to \$800,000 in today's money—in cash. slaves, livestock, crops and securities) plus two young children, her own personal beauty, grace, charm, and proven talent to run the household of a large plantation; George bringing into it skills as a business and financial manager, as a guardian for the two children, and as an attractive man. She would be a warm personal companion and an ideal hostess, a definite asset in his budding career. He would be an ideal new father for her children and a strong protector of her wealth.

The potential for such a gifted and talented couple was awesome to consider.

Most writers also, however, declare it was not a love match. Both knew the other was not the first or greatest love. George Washington's earlier affection for Sally Fairfax continued in strong evidence all his life. Martha, having had the security of a happy prior marriage, seemed to understand and not be overly upset by George's feelings for Sally Fairfax. Martha also knew Sally was contentedly married to someone else all during the time George became infatuated with Sally, when he was age 16 until very late in his life. Martha had plenty of practical, common sense.

The couple promptly set about making preparations for a wedding. On April 5, 1758, less than two weeks after the engagement, George sent a letter to London ordering: ... as much of the best superfine blue cotton velvet

as will make a coat, waistcoat and breeches for a tall man, with a fine silk button to suit it . . . 6 pairs of the very neatest shoes . . . and 6 pairs of gloves . . . '

And at almost precisely the same time Martha Custis wrote to her clothier in London for:

"... one genteel suite of clothes for myself to be grave but not to be extravagent and not to be mourning..." She also ordered enough yellow brocaded grosgrain silk to make a costume, some pink lukestring, a white and garnet egret and a long, white necklace. Martha's letter included an intimate item: "... I have

sent a night gound to be dide of an fashionable Color fitt for me to ware"

On May 4, 1758, about five weeks after the engagement, George Washington ordered a wedding ring for Philadelphia. No description of this ring has been located. It cost the then considerable sum of £2, 16 shillings.

Few reliable facts have been found about the personel relationship during the engagement period. George was miles away fighting in the Indian Wars for those eight months. The relationship would have to be by letters. But, to the eternal frustration of historians, Martha burned all letters to her from George shortly after his death in 1799. Included in the destruction were any pre-marriage letters in addition to the accumulation during 40 years of marriage. Only one letter appears and it is referred to by many biographers as the "first love letter" from George to Martha. It reads in full as follows:

July 20, 1758

We have begun our march for the Ohio. A courier is starting for Williamsburg, and I embrace the opportunity to send a few words to one whose life is now inseparable from mine. Since that happy hour when we made our pledges to each other, my thoughts have been continually going to you as to another Self. That an all-powerful Providence may keep us both in safety is the prayer of your ever faithful and affectionate friend.

Romanticists like this letter but there is considerable doubt that it was ever actually written by George Washington. One of Washington's most respected biographers. Douglas Southall Freeman, concludes it is a forgery. In making a scholarly and astute detailed analysis, Freeman's main reasons for deciding it is a forgery are: (1) it is worded and written in a style and contains spelling that simply cannot be George Washinton's, and (2) factually there was no such march planned on or about the indicated date.

Regarding the wedding ceremony itself, there is better, although widely scattered and somewhat inconclusive information. The following account represents a consolidation of the consistent statements made by several authors. It is believed to be as accurate and complete a version as has been assembled to date.

The wedding day, January 6, 1759, began with light snow flurries on the ground, frozen hard. Martha's home. White House Plantation on the banks of the Pamunkey River, New Kent County, Virginia, burst into frenzied activities. The outdoor kitchen and smoke house were in operation. Inside the floors were being polished, fires started in each fireplace, fresh white candles put into sconces and chandeliers. Large platters of ham and chicken were prepared. Cakes were set up. Wine and rum were carried up from the ceitar.

George Washington arrived on the scene from Williamsburg on horseback in the early morning. It was to be a wedding ceremony attended by Virginia ansteeracy, friends and neighbors. Guests began to arrive about mon and were helped from coaches and carriages by servents dressed in white and purple fivery. The frozen ground became muddy from the carriage wheels. Among the

guests were the Governor of Virginia, Francis Fauquier, wearing scarlet and gold, and the Speaker of the House of Burgesses, John Robinson.

The ceremony was performed about 1:30 P.M. or 2:00 P.M. The exact hour seems impossible to determine. Governor Fauquier was among the last to arrive and it appears that he came after 1:00 P.M. The bride was clad in yellow brocaded grosgrain silk, trimmed with pink lukestring, and was bedecked with matching earrings, bracelet and necklace of white pearls. She wore diamond buckles on her tiny, white satin slippers. The bridegroom wore his new Virginia Regiment uniform of blue cloth lined with red silk over an embroidered white satin waistcoat, with white gloves, gold shoebuckles and a straight dress sword.

Martha Custis stood 5 feet tall; George Washington was 6 feet, 2 inches. Martha was plump with small hands and feet. George was slender and muscular with huge hands and size 13 shoes. Martha's dark hair set off her hazel eyes, wide brows, strongly curved nose and soft, round chin. George's hair was auburn and he had bluegrey eyes; his features were sharp and well-defined. A striking couple—she so petite, fragile, diminutive, feminine; he so tall, large-boned, athletic, totally masculine.

George's affectionate and pet nickname for Martha was "Patsy." Martha privately called George her "old man."

The couple joined hands in the drawing room, before the Reverend Mossom. They stood beneath a chandelier with four white candles. At least six sconces each with two white candles were in the room. The best evidence is that 36 to 40 guests attended the ceremony, with about a dozen servants peeking into the room as they became man and wife.

In accord with the custom of the times, the bride and groom did not go off on a honeymoon but stayed and entertained their most intimate friends. "Feasting and festivity" continued unabated for about three full days. Biographers have called it a "tireless orgy of festivities." George is reported to have danced with every woman at least once. Martha, a bit more shy and modest and decidedly less vigorous, apparently was less accomodating to each and every male guest.

When the celebration finally ended, George and Martha Washington continued to live at her home. He journeyed to Williamsburg so he could attend to his political duties as an elected member of the House of Burgesses, which duties began on his 27th birthday, February 22, 1759.

It is not clear whether Martha-accompanied him on the 33-mile trip to Williamsburg for this important business.

The couple were also waiting for George's home at Mount Vernon to be readied. George, during the engagement period, had ordered the addition of one story to the 11/2 story original house in preparation for his new wife and two-children. And shortly before leaving White House Plantation, he instructed his overseer at Mount Vernon to have "the House very well cleaned," and "you must get two of the best Bedsteads put up" and "get some Eggs and Chickens, and prepare in the best manner

They arrived with full bag and baggage-trunk loads of personal belongings and their worldly possessionsexactly three months after their wedding day, i.e. on April 6, 1759. The couple considered it their marital home for the next 40 years.

The union that began as a marriage of convenience, and probably relatively devoid of love, grew into one of sincere affection bringing mutual happiness and permanently meaningful love. George wrote in 1785: "I have always considered marriage as the most interesting event of one's life, the foundation of happiness or misery." He wore a locket containing Martha's picture around his neck for the last 24 years of his life.

Many observers, on the scene as well as later, have considered George and Martha the perfect couple who had meshed so well and complimented each other ideally. Vice President John Adams summed it up, and paid perhaps the highest possible compliment to Martha Washington when he questioned: "Would Washington have been the commander of the Revolutionary Army or the President of the United States if he had not married this rich widow?"



Acknowledgments, Thoughts and Bits of Information

When I first started to write my family history, I only intended to write a brief family record of what I could remember and find for my brother, sisters, nephews and neices. This was to cover only what I knew of the Owens, Andrews, Mangum and Rennolds families. I was very interested in getting some information on my father's mother, as at that time I could only guess what her family name was. I knew her given name to be flizabeth fllen - no more. However, in my searching and research, the material that became available to me on all of them, through cousins I discovered I had and records I received from them and State Historical Societies, it became a monumental job. Due to lack of time, I did not try to look into the records on great-grandfather Robert Y. Mangum and his wife Many flizabeth (Howard) Mangum. On great-grandfather Matthew Owens, the only records I got was what was told me by members of the Solon and James William Owens families. For not doing a better job, I am deeply sorry for these forgotten ones were wonderful people and we should be thankful that they were our ancestors.

The Andrews Family

The name of Andrews is not common, it being 152 in rank of names. St. Andrew is the patron saint of Scotland. However, all people of this name are not necessarily of Scottish descent. The family name Andrews is a good example of the evolutionary development of names, for it is the English version of the Scottish name Andrew. It was particularly popular as a surname in Scotland because of the patron saint. The name Andrew is Greek, meaning manly. The Scots attempted to monopolize the name but nonetheless it spread through out Europe particularly in England in the Counties of Connwall, Devon, Dorset, Hants and Wiltis" which is part of the southwestern portion of England. The statement in quotes came from the pamphlet on the Andrews family. Approximately in 1600 the emigration of people from England began in earnest to the new world and during this migration Andrews settled along the Atlantic sea coast from South Carolina to the New England states. A descendant, Mrs. Bessie Andrews Derfler of Kansas City, Missouri stated that our ancestor line was Scotch English of Edinburgh, Scotland and settled near Ashland, North Carolina. Most of the material I have used here and some of the individual families that will follow is being taken from the book of the "Rennolds Family Genealogy" which was researched and compiled over the years by our cousin Hazel Rennolds Sanders.

John Andrews Sn.

John Andrews b. 1758 no place of birth given but probably in North Carolina on Maryland. D. 6 May 1814 Surry County, North Carolina. There is nothing on parentage. However, a descendant, Mrs. Bessie Andrews Derfler, Kansas City, Mo., said that John was Scotch English of Edinburg, Scotland, and settled near Ashland, North Carolina. He married Nancy Briscoe, ca. 1781. She was born in 1757 in Maryland and died in 1861, Howard County, Mo. She is listed in 1850 census Howard County, Mo., as living with a son Mose Andrews. Her age was listed as 93 and born in Maryland. She is buried in New Hope Cemetary, Howard County, Mo. by the graveside of her son Mose Andrews. There is no stone on her grave. John Andrews was a Revolutionary War soldier. He served as a private in Captain Elijah Lyons' Company with North Carolina troops. As a result of this service, his wife Nancy finally after some time received a small widow's pension in 1844. If they so wish, any female descendant of John Andrews can use his Revolutionary War service to become a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution. John had a brother Joseph Andrews, who lived in Surry County, North Carolina. Joseph moved to Tennessee in 1812, then in 1830 to Howard County, Mo. He had a son by the name of James Andrews b. 17 April 1787 in Rowan County, North Carolina. James settled in Chariton County, Mo.

John Sr. is a great-grandfather to Elizabeth Ann Meredith who married John Thomas Rennolds on 23 Jan. 1862, Howard County, Mo. He was a grandfather of John In's descendants including John T., Samuel and James Madison Andrews. John and his wife Nancy Briscoe had nine children of whom we have a record of only five. It could be that the other four also remained in North Carolina or adjacent states and never came to Missouri. Hazel Sanders, Helen Smyth and their brother (Lyde Thomas Rennolds (deceased) are also descendants of John and his wife Nancy Briscoe Andrews. Since John was born in the Colonies in 1758, his parents were either born here or immigrated here some time before John Sr.'s birth. It is possible that even his grandparents were here before his father was born and he could be either

first on third generation.

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It is interesting to note that John Sn died when he was 56 years old. His wife Nancy Briscoe Andrews at the time was 57 years old and lived until she was 104 years old. She was a widow for 47 years and died five years before her son Mose with whom she lived. John Sr. probably followed farming on its related industries for a living. John Sr. and Nancy Briscoe were my great-great-grandparents. Nancy Briscoe Andrews' widows pension from John Sr.'s service in the Revolutionary War was \$69.77 per annum. This was from the Pension Act of 1844. Following are the names of the known children. Sally Andrews b. ca. 1783. She married a man whose last name was Spencer. We have no further record of her and her husband except that they remained in North Carolina and did not come to Missouri.

John Andrews Jr. b. 1785 North (arolina, d. 30 May 1852 Howard County, Mp. He married Elizabeth Meredith on 14 Aug. 1816, Jackson County, Tenn. Elizabeth b. 1788 in Virginia, d. 20 Nov. 1865 Howard County, Mp. They are both buried in New Hope Cemetary, Howard County, Mp.

Rebecca Andrews b. 1787, probably in North Carolina. She married and remained there with her husband. No other information or records available. She was the third child of John and Nancy Andrews.

Mose Andrews b. 15 Oct. 1791, North Carolina. D. 17 Sept. 1876 Howard County, Mo. Married Mary "Polly" Fields 9 Apr. 1828, Howard County, Mo. She was born 1811 Kentucky. D. 1889 Howard County, Mo. They are both buried in New Hope Cemetary, Howard County, Mo. To this union eleven children were born. After John Sr. died in 1814 his wife Lived with this son until her death in 1861. She is buried beside him in New Hope Cemetary.

Isaac Briscoe Andrews b. some time around 1793, probably in North Carolina.

m. Nancy Elizabeth Walker. Both probably remained in North Carolina or adjacent states and did not come to Missouri.

John Andrews Jr.

John Andrews Jr. b. 1785, North Carolina, d. 30 May 1852 Howard County, Mo., m. Elizabeth Meredith 14 Aug. 1816 Jackson County, Tenn. She was born 1788 in Virginia, d. 20 Nov. 1865 Howard County, Mo. They are both buried in New Hope Cemetary, Howard County, Mo. John was the second child of John Sr. and Mary Briscoe Andrews. He was a veteran of the War of 1812. From this military service his wife Elizabeth received a small widow's pension. John also received a piece of land in Howard County, Mo. for that service under the Land Bounty Act. John Jr. and Elizabeth Ann (Meredith) Andrews are my great-grandparents. I spent a great amount of time Looking for them. John Jr. and

- I. Aaron Andrews b. 1817 in Tennesee. The Missouri researcher lists Aaron as being married to Mildred Barnes 24 Dec. 1839 by William P. Hubbard, J.P., recorded 21 Jan. 1840. Records show that Aaron was appointed by his father John Andrews Sr. as the Executor of his will, which was made in Howard County, Mo. This indicates that he came to Howard County with his parents and also died and was buried there.
- 2. Jane Andrews b. 1819, probably in Tennessee, m. John M. Douglas 3 Jan. probably 1837. The record shows 1814 so this is obviously an error. During this period the women usually married between 18 and 20 years.
- 3. Malinda Andrews b. 6 Mar. 1820 Howard County, Mo., m. 6 Oct. 1858
 Isham Walker b. 19 Mar. 1815, Wayne County, Ky., d. 22 Feb. 1877
 Macon County, Mo. When Isham Walker's first wife Mahetable Murphy died Leaving him with 7 children, he went down to Howard
 County and brought back his second wife Malinda Andrews, daughter of John Andrews Jr. to Macon County, Mo. It must have been a surprise to his children. Isham and Malinda had two children Anna D. Walker b. 12 July 1859, m. George Wisdom. Susan Mary
 Walker b. 4 Dec. 1860, first husband E. Smith, second husband A. J.
 Marsh.

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- 4. Martha "Patsy" Andrews b. 1823 Howard County, Mo., d. ca. 1856
 Howard County, Mo., m. Thomas Meredith 4. Feb. 1841. He was
 b. 1822 Tennessee, d. 1852 Howard County, Mo. He was a wagoner and
 farmer. Thomas and Martha "Patsy" Andrews had seven children. Patsy
 was about 33 years old when she died and Thomas was 30 years of age.
- 5. Elijah "Lige" Andrews b. Howard County, Mo. in 1826, m. Sarah Ann Hudson 9 Nov. 1848 Howard County, Mo. She was born probably in Howard County in 1830. Marriage performed by Samuel C. Major, J.P. A relative of the family said that they had 3 sons and one daughter; Joe, Pete, Napoleon "Pole", and Leona called "Big Leona". However the 1870 census of this family living in Boonefeurno Township, probably Howard County, lists them as follows:

The 1870 (ensus was taken July 22, 1870. Efforts are being made to verify this discrepancy but we have very little to nely upon, except census records. Nothing further is available at this time. Elijah was not a (ivil War veteran.

- 6. John Thomas Andrews b. 12 Feb. 1829 Howard County, Mo., d. 9 Sept. 1896 in Midland County, Midland, Texas. Married his second wife Cassie Cherry Walker b. 1 Mar 1837 probably in Howard County, Mo., d. 15 Apr. 1923 Midland, Midland County, Texas. They were married 22 Mar. 1854 by John McCune. John T. Andrews' great-grandson Bill Andrews says that John T. Andrews' first wife died in child birth on shortly thereafter. There was a child born to this union who was raised by some member of the family. To his union with Cassie Cherry 8 children were born. A further write up of John T. and his family will be found later on. John T. was not in the Civil War.
- 7. Francis Marion Andrews b. 1832 Howard County, Mo., d. 19 Jan. 1904 in Hunnevell, Shelby County, Mo. He was a veteran of the Civil War, enlisting on 12 Feb. 1862. He served the full duration of the War even though he was wounded in an engagement that lead to a permanent disability. He never married. A further write up of Marion will be found later on in this history.
- 8. Sarah Andrews b. 1835, d. 1869., m. 1854 Handin Madison Douglas b. 25
 Oct. 1832 Howard County, Mo., d. 1915. Sarah and Handin had six children, among whom were Rhoda Ellen Douglas who m. Peter Parker Chapman b. 1854, d. 1919. They had one daughter Anna Chapman b. 1882 Brown County, Ill. d. at Hunnewell, Mo. After Sarah Andrews Douglas died in 1869, Handin Madison Douglas for his second wife married Anne E. Andrews 2 Dec. 1870. No further record on this marriage on the principals. Sarah was 34 years old when she died.
- 9. Samuel Andrews b. 7 Sept. 1836 Howard County, Mo., d. Toyah, Texas
 23 Dec. 1917, m. 4 May 1865 Elizabeth Ellen Rennolds, Howard County,
 Mo. To this union four sons were born. Samuel was a veteran of the

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- (ivil War, enlisting at the same time as Francis Marion, 12 Feb. 1862. He served the full duration of the conflict. A further write up of Samuel and his family will be found later on.
- 10. James Madison Andrews b. 1838 Howard (ounty, Mo., d. 26 June 1915 at ElPaso, Texas, m. Susan Agnes Lessley 20 Feb. 1862, Howard (ounty, Mo. She was b. Howard (ounty, Mo. 23 Nov. 1842, d. 1 July 1884 Howard (ounty, Mo. To this union six children were born. James Andrews was a veteran of the Civil War enlisting 12 Apr. 1863. He served the balance of the conflict. A further write up follows on him.
- 11. Elizabeth Andrews b. 1840. No further record. However John Jr. in his will called her Ann. This brings up a question, could her name have been Ann Elizabeth or Elizabeth Ann or plain Elizabeth? Hardin Douglas married a second Andrews girl whose name was Ann E. Andrews. (ould this be the same person? We probably will never know.

I would like to say a bit more concerning John Andrews Jr. His daughter Martha "Patsy" Andrews married her first cousin Thomas Meredith on 4 Feb. 1841. He was a nephew of John In. 's wife Elizabeth Meredith. This did not sit too well with John. Relatives say that he disowned her and never visited on had anything to do with them for the rest of his life. When John Ir. made his will 19 Apr. 1852, he willed outright to the other ten children an equal share 1/11 of his property. However, the following is a statement from the will concerning his treatment of Patsy: "To my son, Aaron Andrews I give also one-eleventh part of the proceeds of the sale of my said estate for the use and benefit how ever to my beloved daughter "Patsy" now "Patsy" Meredith and the Legitimate heirs of her body. This my will that said Aaron Andrews shall hold the property or effects which shall accrue to my said daughter Patsy in trust, first giving security for all sums of money or property which shall come into his hands, in fiduciary capacity". Some of the sons, probably Aaron, remained on the property for some time after John passed away. Patsy died in 1856, four years after John died and Thomas Meredith died in 1852 the same year John Ir. died, so there was a fight and hard feelings for nothing over this marriage. I do not know how this was settled finally. Patsy and her husband had a daughter Elizabeth Ann Meredith who married John Thomas Rennolds, a brother of our grandmother Elizabeth Ellen Rennolds Andrews. John

Thomas Rennolds was a nephew of Sarah Ellen Rennolds Lessley. You can see by this that the Rennolds, Andrews and Lessley families were closely nelated. I do not have any more information on the following children of John In. and Elizabeth Ann Andrews other than what I have written of Aaron, Jane, Malinda, Martha "Patsy", Elijah "Lige", Sarah and Elizabeth. It appears that John might have known when he made his last will and testament on 19 Apr. 1852 that the grim reaper was near for he died on 30 May 1852, just one month and eleven days after he signed his will. He left a wife and four teenage children. I suppose that they kept the farm in operation and his wife Elizabeth Ann took care of the children until they were able to take care of themselves. In his will he made provisions that the property could not be sold until the death of his wife. Almost all that I have written concerning John Sr. and John Jr. and their families was taken from the book of the "Rennolds Family Genealogy". I am indebted to Hazel Rennolds Sanders, who is my cousin on my Grandmother's side of the family Elizabeth Ellen Rennolds Andrews.

John Thomas Andrews

John Thomas Andrews, sixth child and third son of John In. and Elizabeth Ann Meredith Andrews, was born 12 Feb. 1829 in Howard County, Mo., d. 9 Sept. 1896 in Midland, Texas. His relatives state that John was married twice. His first wife died either in childbirth or shortly afterwards. The son was given to relatives who raised him. We do not know his first wife's name or the child's name. This marriage must have occurred about 1850. For his second wife he took (assie (herry Walker on 22 Mar. 1854. She was born 1 Mar. 1837, being 18 years of age at the time of her marriage. She died 9 Apr. 1923 at Midland, Texas. (assie (herry's first name was (asander (herry but she always went by the name of Cassie Cherry. She was a sister to Liza Jane Walker (a twin) who was the second wife of Richard Lindsay Rennolds. Richard Lindsay was my greatgrandfather, being the father of my grandmother Elizabeth Eller Rennolds Andrews. She was the wife of Samuel Andrews, better known as "Uncle Bodie" by his netatives. Liza Jane and Cassie Cherry's father and mother were Johnson Walker and Sophia Waincott Walker. Sophia was the second wife of Johnson Walker. He and his first wife had 10 children 7 sons and 3 daughters, and by his second wife Eliza Jane also had 10 children, 7 girls and 3 sons, for a total of 20 children. John Thomas followed farming for a living and was also a Justice of the Peace

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while in Missouri. The family lived near Bunker Hill in Howard County. For some reason, in 1875 he joined a wagon train with his family and made a long trip with a large group to Texas. He and his family settled at a small place called (alvert, which was southeast of Waco, Texas. Sometime after arriving members of his family became ill, and he lost his son Willie, born about 1866 on 1867, who was 12 years old at the time of his death. He became involved in an accident with a team of horses that dragged him to death. We do not know how long they remained at Calvert, Texas, but at some time around 1878 they were at Baird, Texas, where his son Pony was born. This area is near Abilene, Texas. Pony was married in 1900 and I estimated his birth at 1876 on 24 years old, so of course, this could be subject to change. Probably some time after the 1880s, he moved on to Midland because his last child was born in 1878, in either Abilene or Midland, Texas. After reaching Midland, he assembled a fair sized ranch near Odessa, Texas. In the 1890s his brother Samuel and his children John Ashley, James Howard and Theodore moved to the Midland or Monahans area. A little later his youngest brother James Madison, having lost all his family in marriage, death or old enough to care for themselves, moved to the Midland and Monahans area also. By this time John T.'s life was coming to an end. He is buried in Midland beside his brother Samuel and other members of his family. He and Cassie Cherry had 9 children:

 - a. James Sherman Searles, m. Margaret Freezenhan 4 children born to this union: Judy, Jane, Diane and Mary Lou.

She and her husband raised two of her sister Sophia Andrews Spearman's children. The children are Lillie and Frank Spearman. They took the Barclay name. Lillie m. Lewis Doyle and Lives at Lubbock, Texas. Frank m. Irene Zoller. They live at Ft. Worth, Texas.
- III. Jacob Johnson Andrews b. 22 Feb. 1860, Howard County, Mo., d. Dec. 1951 in Monahans, Texas, m. Callie Bailey 17 Feb. 1897 in Odessa, Texas. No record of her birth but she died 13 May 1909, Probably was born some where near 1877. Both buried in Odessa, Texas. To this union 3 children were born:
 - 1. Vincent Andrews b. 18 Dec. 1897, Odessa, Texas, d. in Monahans, Texas. No date of death, m. Sirelda Elizabeth Estes in Pecos, Texas. Both buried in Monahans, Texas. To this union two children were born:

Texas. To this union 3 children were born:

- 1. (Lyde Andrews b. 1902 probably in the Midland, Texas Area, m. (harlie Lee Godgers. They had 3 children: 1-Walter, 2-Jim, 3-a girl.

- V. Willie Andrews b. ca 1866 on 1867, Probably in Howard (ounty, Mo., d. when he was 12 years old, probably near Abilene, Texas. Since his brother Pony Andrews was b. 1875 or 1876 at Baird, Texas, and Willie died in 1878 on 1879, he must have died near Abilene, otherwise he would have been buried at Midland. I am guessing at his age and death location.
- VI. Sophia Andrews b. ca 1869-70, probably in Howard County, Mo., d. about 1896-97 south of Abilene, Texas, m. Frank Spearman. She probably married and lived her life around Abilene. To this union 4 children were born:
 - 1. George, 2. Jim, 3. Lillie born ca 1893, 4. Frank. Lillie and Frank were raised by their aunt Ella Mae Andrews. No record as to who took the other two. Lillie m. Lewis Doyle and Frank m. Irene Zoller.

 Mar. 1959 Monahans, Texas, m. 1 Nov. 1891 to William Hiram Williams
 (Billy) b. 7 Dec. 1859, d. 10 Sept. 1926 Monahans, Texas. Both probably buried there also. To this union 3 children were born:
 - 1. Reene Williams b. 3 Oct. 1892 Midland, Texas, m. Jack Wright. She is still living (1979). They had one child:

Francis Marion Andrews, 7th child and 4th son of John and Elizabeth Ann Andrews was born in Howard County, Mo. in 1832. d. 19 Jan. 1904, Hunnewell, Shelby County, Mr. He was a veteran of the Civil War. He was a volunteer and was in (o. A 9th Regiment, Missouri State Militia Cavalry. He enlisted 12 Feb. 1862 Sturgeon, Mp. at the age of 30. He was 5' 7" tall, hair light, eyes blue and fair complexion. He served for the duration of the war, even though he was severely injured in a clash with a group of guerrillas, receiving a gunshot wound in an elbow and shoulder that rendered the arm almost useless. Later in life he got involved in a farming accident that did make the arm useless. Also about this time he developed diabetes and cataracts on both eyes. Correspondence concerning his pension indicates that in his later years life was quite miserable. He never married. My father often talked of his Uncle Marion as he was known by the family, and he also said that he was deaf as the result of his army service, and a train ran over him and killed him. However, the pension correspondence and medical records do not say anything about being deaf. His becoming deaf might have occurred during the last years of his life for he was 72 years old when he died. And a train did not run over him. In the 1890s he tried to get an increase in pension benefits as he was almost helpless and needed monetary aid very badly but from the records I have found, I could never determine whether an increase in pension was ever received. For the injury that he sustained during the war, he only received \$4.00 per month. The government during this period was very reluctant to give any of their soldiers a pension. This policy continued until the Pension Act of 1890 on there about.

Elizabeth Ellen Rennolds

Elizabeth Ellen Rennolds was the 3rd child and only daughter of Richard Lindsey Rennolds and his wife Tarza Winn Rennolds. Born in 1847 Howard County, Mo., she spent her girlhood in this county. On 4 May 1865 she was united in marriage to Samuel Andrews, 23 days after he was mustered out of the Union Army. At their wedding, their friends and relatives held a mock military wedding, which always was quite amusing to my father and mother, for to them it showed that their relatives and friends liked to play jokes on each other. We have a picture of her that was taken when she was 19 years old, so it must have been taken shortly before or after her marriage. It shows that she was dark and very lovely. Their marriage certificate shows that they were married by Elder James Barnes of Howard County. The Andrews name was spelled "Andrews" which misled me in my search for family records.

After she and grandfather were married, he gave her \$30 to buy items to set up housekeeping. She bought what she needed and gave him back some of the money.

To this union four sons were born: John Ashley, James Howard, Adolph (Rennolds) and Theodore. As grandfather followed farm work, they moved frequently. Records show that they lived in Howard, Randolph and Saline (ounties. On 26 June 1879 Elizabeth Ellen died of tuberculosis at the age of 32 years in Saline (ounty. I have never been able to locate her grave. A 1880 census record made 4 June of that year shows that grandfather and his four little boys were still in Saline (ounty, near a place called Cambridge Township, boarding with another family. So there is a strong possibility that she was buried in Saline (ounty.

Some time during the 1880s my father went to live with his mother's Aunt Sarah Ellen Rennolds Lessley. It is quite possible that Theodore and James Howard were also taken in by their great-aunt. The only record of John Ashley is that some time during the 1880s he and a cousin or friend went to southwest Texas near Midland and Odessa where his Uncle John T. Andrews and family lived. John T. had a son a little older than Johnny, and they were quite fond of each other so he moved down there to be closer to him. Uncle John told wonderful stories of the West Texas country. In my search perhaps some day I may be lucky and locate where Grandmother is Lying. I may as

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well admit that I have a special niche in my heart for this little grandmother and she is a constant companion in my thoughts and prayers. It
is well to remember that her mother Tarza Winn died when she was 30 years
old, and her grandmother Mariah Wills died early in life, at about age
26 years. Her father Richard Lindsey Rennolds married his second wife
3 months and 29 days after he lost his first wife Tarza. That he had
two little motherless children to take care of could have prompted him
somewhat to get another wife to help care for them. It is also believed
that her brother and family were living in the Cambridge Township near
Samuel and his family at the time of Elizabeth Ellen's death.
Vital statistics records Howard County, No., list her "Turza" Winn instead of "Tarza" Winn. It probably never will be known which spelling is

Sarah Ellen (Rennolds) Lessley

Sarah Ellen (Rennolds) Lessley was the 2nd child and first daughter of Thomas C. Rennolds and Mariah Wills Rennolds. She was born 10 Apr. 1823 Clark County, Kentucky. When she was about seven years old her mother died and her father moved to Boone County, Mo. After getting his family settled, he returned to Kentucky for another load of household goods and other property. Sarah Eller evidently did not like Missouri very well for she hid in a barrel or a box that was making the return trip to Kentucky. However, her father soon discovered her and made her neturn to the other members of the family. There was a lot of weeping and wailing over this mistreatment. After her father returned the family settled down and Sarah Ellen grew to womanhood. She married James Harvey Lessley who was b. 1 Oct. 1819, on 29 Jan. 1842, Howard County where Sarah Ellen remained the rest of her life. To this union 11 children were born, 7 of whom survived. Her husband enlisted in Company G, 9th Regiment Missouri State Cavalry. He was wounded on thrown from his horse and crippled for life. He died 29 Aug. 1872. During his lifetime he was a prosperous farmer and stockman of Howard County. After his death, Sarah Ellen continued to openate the farm with outside help. When her neice Elizabeth Ellen, wife of Samuel Andrews, died on 26 June 1879 she took one of Elizabeth Ellen's little boys Adolph (Rennolds), and took care of him until he was able to take care of himself. I do not know who took Adolph's brothers James Howard and Theodore, but it is quite possible that Sarah Ellen Lessley took them too. Their father Samuel was also there for a while.

Sarah Ellen's brother Richard Lindsey Rennolds was the father of Elizabeth Ellen Andrews. Sarah Ellen's daughter Susan Agnes was Elizabeth Ellen's cousin and the wife of Samuel Andrews' brother James Madison. Being all

related they stayed close together.

Sarah Ellen was a small, nice looking woman. However, I believe from remarks by my father concerning her it would indicate that she was a hard taskmaster.

It was a sad happening that death hit both families. Elizabeth Ellen's mother Tarza Winn was first to go at the age of 30. Next was Elizabeth Ellen, her daughter, on 26 June 1879 at the age of 32; Susan Agres following next on 1 July 1884 at the age of 42 years, and then her daughter Elizabeth Ellen (Sis) on 18 Jan. 1893 at the age of 25. Such a loss of family members

especially wives, mothers and cousins always made my father say that that area of Missouri was very unhealthy. After all this great loss, Sanah Ellen Lessley lived to the nipe old age of 91 years, passing away on 27 Apr. 1914 near Glasgow, Howard County, Mo. She is buried in Richland Cemetary near Glasgow, Mo. where her husband James Harvey was buried.

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Samuel Andrews, 9th child and 5th son of John Jn. and Elizabeth Ann Meredith Andrews, was b. 7 Sept. 1836 near the town of Fayette in Howard County, Mo. He was 6' tall, light complexion, hazel eyes and dark hair. This description was taken from his army record. He was a veteran of the Civil War. On Jan. 20, 1862, at the age of 26, while living at Myers, Missouri, he volunteered for military service in the Missouri State Militia Cavalry. On Feb. 12, 1862 he was mustered in as a private, assigned to Company A, 9th Regiment, Missouri State Militia Cavalry. Shortly thereafter, this unit was incorporated into the Union forces. This was the same unit and regiment that his brother Francis Marion enlisted in. In November of 1863 he brought his horse and equipment into the army. The horse was valued at \$110 and equipment \$30. Later the horse was revalued at \$100. On Feb. 11, 1865 he and his horse were mustered out of the army at St. Louis, Mo. I might say that Marion also furnished his horse while in the army.

On May 4, 1865 he married Elizabeth Ellen Rennolds at Fayette, Howard County, Mr. She was born in 1847 and was probably 19 years old at the time. Both were from Fayette, Howard County, Mo. To this union four sons were born: John Ashley, James Howard, Adolph (Rennolds) and Theodore. Samuel did farm work for a living and consequently moved considerably. During their married life, they lived in Howard, Randolph and Saline Counties, Mo. On June 26, 1879, he lost his wife Elizabeth Ellen, Leaving him with four little mother-Less boys. The 1880 Census of Saline County on June 4 showed that he and his children were still in Saline County, Combridge Township. In view of this, I now believe that Samuel and members of his family did not go to southwest Texas near John T. Andrews and his family until sometime close to 1890. In my first write-up on his oldest son John Ashley Andrews, I thought that he Left Missouri for Texas right after his mother's death. Now I know that he could not have started on this trip until some time after 1880. There was also an error in Theodore's birth date and date of death. It should read b. 22 Feb. 1874 and d. 7 Feb. 1951. So connect your write-up accordingly on the pages of these two. My granifation

John Ashley Andrews

John Ashley Andrews, better known as Johnny, was the first child of Samuel and Elizabeth Ellen Rennolds Andrews. He was born 13 July 1866 in Howard County, Mo. He was about 6' tall, brown eyes, dark hair and fair complexion. He was probably named for his grandfather John Andrews Jr. No one knows from whom the name Ashley was taken. However, at that time the name was prominent in certain areas of Missouri. His mother died 26 June 1879 in Saline County, No., just prior to his 13th birthday. According to the 1880 (ensus of Saline County, Mo., he, his brothers and father were still living in Saline (ounty. So it is now thought that he did not go to Texas until some time in the 1880s, probably after he became 18 years old or thereabout. At this time he had an uncle, John T. Andrews, a brother of his father, who was ranching in Texas, southeast of Abilene on in the Midland area. Johnny said that this uncle "told some interesting and impressive tales concerning Texas". Beside his uncle had three sons, one of whom was a year older than Johnny. This was James Madison and they got along very well together. So, some time when he was old enough he departed by horseback for Texas. Johnny mode one house and Led another one that carried a pack containing all his personal belongings. According to him "he came down in spurts", probably having to stop and work a while in order to get enough money to go on. He stopped at Greenville and Clyde for a while and on to Abilene, where he soon got in touch with this cousin, and they went job hunting. They finally found a job to help trail drive 2, 100 head of cattle to Denver, Colorado.

He came to Midland in 1890 and worked for the J. H. Ranch for several years in Midland (ourty and at Jal, New Mexico. One day he traded an old grey horse for a water well. This became the foundation of his ranch, which ran just east of Odessa to about half way to Midland. When he first came to the Midland-Odessa country, he made several trail drives of cattle to northern ranges in Colorado, Wyoming and possibly Montana.

On May 3, 1899 he married Alice Ada Jones of (Lyde, Texas. To this union 4 sons and one daughter were born. Of the five children born Edmond(Eddie) (now deceased), (arl (deceased) and Marie survived. Henry A., the oldest, died at the age of 15 years. John Jr., the youngest, was not yet a year old when he died. About this time, due to the ill-health of his wife, he moved from his ranch to Midland and entered the meat market business. He probably sold his ranch some

time during this period. However, he still owned several sections of farm land that he leased out. On 13 Aug. 1916, he lost his wife, Alice Ada Andrews. This left him with 3 small children. In 1919 on thereabouts, he remarried. His second wife was Jessie Bertha Hawkins, who was born 13 Dec. 1898 in Wilson (ounty, Texas, d. 7 Aug. 1967 Midland, Texas Jessie Andrews was married to Johnny until his death 3 Mar. 1959 at Midland, Texas. Johnny, his first and second wives, his children Henry A. and John Jr. are all buried in the Midland (emetary.

James Howard Andrews

James Howard Andrews, second child of the Andrews family, was born March 21, 1868 in Howard County, Missouri. He died December 10, 1909. He was also known as "Bud" by close associates and members of his family. He was probably about 6' tall, and his pictures show that he was quite dark complexined and dark eyes. He was only eleven years old when his muther died, and probably went to live with friends or a relative. We do not know which. When he became old enough to take care of himself, he settled in West Texas near his oldest brother, Johnny. The most of his life was spent on railroad construction, handling crews in the construction of road beds and laying tracks. Some of this work took him as far west as Tucson, Arizona. Considerable time on construction was spent in the vicinity of Bisbee, Arizona. In 1909 he was working on the west coast of lexico. At that time he was probably also working on railroad construction, as at that time there was considerable railroad expansion taking place in this part of Mexico. He was there with a buddy who became ill with a dysentery infection. Bud, against better advice, stayed and nursed him back to health. Before they could leave, Bud contracted the disease and died. He was buried in Nexico, but after a few years his body was brought back to Midland, Texas and is buried in the Andrews cemetery plot.

He never married, but I heard my parents say that at one time he was engaged to be married, but the bride-to-be backed out at the last moment. We are indebted to him for the few family pictures we have. The only picture of his mother was given to us by him. He also sent us several pictures of railroad construction and mines, probably around the Bisbee area. All these pictures were made by a studio in Tucson, Arizona Territory.

Since preparing the above, I have discovered a record that shows that Bud was buried in the State of Sinola, near Mazatlan, Mexico, and was removed from there in January 1910, and returned to Midland, Texas. His body did not remain in Mexico as long as I had thought.

Adulph Andrews

Adolph Andrews, the third son of the Andrews family, was born Pay 6, 1871 in Howard County, Missouri. He was about 5'10" tall, grey eyes, sandy hair, and light complexion. During his childhood with his family, they lived in Howard, Randolph and Saline Counties. There is a possibility that they also lived in Boone (ounty. On June 26, 1879 his mother died, and he went to live with a firs. Lessley, the mother-in-law of James h. Andrews, his uncle, and a brother of his father. He was christened Reynolds or Rennald, his mother's maiden name. For some reason he did not like it, so at the first opportunity he charged it. At the time this happened, there lived nearby a young man of German descent, whose first name was Adolph. Father was very fund of him, so he took his name. In 1890 or when he was 19 years old, he moved to northwest Texas. There he got a job with Charles Goodnight, a prominent cattle rancher of the Texas Fanhandle area. I do not know why he did not settle in Southwest Texas with his brother Johnny, Great Uncle John T. Andrews and other relatives. He worked for Godnight until 1900.

On December 25, 1900 he married Elizabeth Marada (Lizzie) Gwens, oldest child and daughter of Solon B. Gwens and Fayetta Mangum Owens. Solon B. Owens was a prominent cattle rancher of Gray and Donley Counties, Texas. To this union five children were born; Solon Adolph, James Samuel; Clarence Robert, Edith Maude, and Willa Roberta.

After his marriage he helped on the Owens ranch, Later became a brand inspector and farmer until 1905. During this time he ran for sheriff on the Republican ticket in Gray County, Texas. He said that Gray County, being a Democratic stronghold, he only received one vote. Soon after this he got into the mercantile business at Alarreed, then Later Groom, Texas. He was in this business for eight or nine years.

Wanderlust hit him, and we moved by covered wagon from Groom to Union County, New Mexico. Here he entered ranching once more. In Union County near Capulin, he got together two nice ranches consisting of 6,300 acres of fine grazing land upon which he ran cattle and sheep. During the depression that followed World War I and very bad luck and judgment, he lost almost everything he owned. He was able to salvage 320 acres of land, some cattle and a few head of horses.

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Father was a good fiddler and he played for lots of dances. Nother would accompany him on the piano. We had lots of good times together. Father was forever looking for greener pastures, so after the losses in Union County, we moved by covered wagon to Tierra Amarilla, New Mexico. He only stayed there two or three years, and then moved by covered wagon to Thompson, Utah where he loaded everything on the train for Lewiston, Idaho to make a fast recovery by raising wheat. After four years at Lewiston, he had nough and he returned by truck to Tierra Amari'la once more. On July 3, 1932 he was killed by lightning while working in a field. His wife, Lizzie, never remarried. She lived with her youngest daughter Roberta and her husband. She passed away April 22, 1960. Buth she and her husband Dolph are buried in the Farmington Cemetery at Farmington, New hexico.) my faction

Solon Adolph Andrews

Solon Adolph, the first child of Adolph and "Lizzie" Andrews, was born November 21, 1901. Relatives report that he was a very bright child and was the apple of his Grandfather Owens' eye. His mother mourned for this child all the rest of her life. She never really got over his death. The doctor attending him at the time listed death from brain fever. This was probably a tumor of the brain, because relatives said that he suffered from terrible headaches for long periods of time. His nickname was "Hooley" and along toward the end of his life, he would cry when he had a headache and say "Little Hooley is going to die". This proved true for he did pass away on November 29, 1904. He is buried near his Grandfather Owens in the Alanreed, Texas cemetery.) by Triting

Theodore Andrews

Theodore Ardrews, also known as Theody, was the fourth and last child of the Ardrews family. He was born February 1876 at loberly, Pissouri, Randolph (ounty. He was about 6' tall, dark eyes and hair, and fair complexion. It is not known what happened to him when his mother died on June 26, 1879. Since he was only three years old at the time, it is thought that he went to live with relatives or a friend until he was able to take care of himself. "Then he reached that time of life, it is thought that he moved to Texas to be near his brothers Johnny and "Bud", and the Andrews group that had settled in Southwest Texas near Conahars. However, there is no record to support this.

In August of 1900 he married Emily Jane Holman. To this union two daughters, Irene and Theo, were born. Theddy spent 30 years working for the Texas and Pacific Railroad. Then he retired in 1928, he held the position of Roadmaster. I can remember when he and his family lived at Toyah, Texas, he was at that time section foreman. So over the years he received advancement with the railroad. He was retired for 22 years. Theddy died on February 7, 1951 at Big Springs, Texas. His wife Emily passed away harch 15, 1964 at Pecos, Texas. Both are buried in the Big Springs Cemetery, Big Springs, Texas. It is to my sorrow that more information concerning him was not available.

James Madison Andrews - b. 8 Nov. 1838, Howard County, Mo., d. 26 June 1915 at El Paso, Texas at the home of his daughter Mary Agnes (Mollie) - Mrs. Ado Rose, of Bright's disease. He was the 10th child and 6th son of John In. and Elizabeth Ann Meredith Andrews. He was a veteran of the Civil War, having served from April 23, 1863 in CompanyA, 9th Regiment Cavalry, Missouri State Militia. His service was probably like that of his brothers Francis Marion and Samuel, being primarily against the guerrilla groups that ranged the border states of Missouri, Kansas, Kentucky and Tennessee. At the time of his enlistment, he was married to Susan Agnes Lessley. The marriage took place 20 Feb. 1862, Howard County, Mp. Susan Agnes was the daughter of James Harvey Lessley and his wife Sarah Ellen Rennolds Lessley, and was born 23 Nov. 1842, Howard County, Mo., d. 1 July 1884. Susan Agnes was a cousin of Samuel's wife Elizabeth Ellen Andrews, a niece of James Madison Andrews' mother-in-law Sarah Ellen Rennolds Lessley. James followed farming to take care of his family and at one time it is believed that he owned his own farm. He spent 58 years in Howard County, No. To this union six children were born: James Owen, John Harvey, Elizabeth Ellen (Sis), Winchester, Mary Agnes (Mollie) and Lessley. Of the six children, only Mollie and Lessley survived. Harvey and Winchester were made blind by some medicine that an itinerant medicine man sold to their father to cure a disease that had infected their eyes. Both were excellent fiddlers. However, my father always said that Harvey was the best. He said that he could remember seeing Harvey and Winchester sitting on stumps near a field that the other members of family were working in. On July 1, 1884 James lost his wife to tuberculosis. Then on 18 Jan. 1893, he lost his daughter Elizabeth Ellen to the same disease. After his wife's death, it is thought that the girls went to live with relatives but Lessley remained with his father. Also some time after Susan Agnes died, he stopped farming and he and his son Lessley traveled over the country playing the fiddle for dances to make a living for the two of them. Some time after 1890 he moved to Texas to be near and Live with his daughter "Mollie" and her husband Ado Rose at El Paso, Texas, where he died from Bright's disease on 26 June 1915. He is buried beside his wife Susan Agnes near Richland, Mo. I don't know whether Mollie and her husband Ado had any children. Lessley Andrews b. 9 Nov. 1877. Howard County, Mo. d. 26 June 1959 Denver, Colo., m. Elma Geneva Yager b. 5 May 1885 Howard County, Mo. d. 6 Sept. 1962 Denver, Colo. Both buried

in Fairmount Cemetary, Denver, Colo. To this union two children were born. Mildred Virginia b. 17 Sep. 1907 Raton, N. Mex. and Lessley Jr. b. 3 Dec. 1921, d. 21 Nov. 1943. Lessley Jr. married but to my knowledge no children were born. Mildred married and had two daughters, Adele and Alice. The girls can pick up the story here and finish it. Susan Agnes was 42 years old at death and her daughter Elizabeth Ellen was 25. She was b. 1 Oct. 1868 and died 18 Jan. 1893. Since writing the above I have learned that Mollie and her husband Ado had no children.

John T. Andrews

John T. Andrews b. 12 Feb. 1829 Howard (o., Missouri, d. 9 Sept. 1896 Midland, Texas. His great-grandson J. W. Andrews says that John T.'s first wife died in childbirth on shortly thereafter. They have no other information concerning this or the whereabouts or name of the child to this marriage.

John T. for his second wife married (assie (herry Walker, probably some time in the 1850s. She was b. 1 March 1837, probably in Howard (o., Missouri and d. 15 April 1923 at Midland, Texas. To this union eight children were born. Their names are Marry, Ella, Jake, James Madison b. 1865 Howard (o., Sophia, Lou, Pony and Kay. John T. moved to Texas around 1895, near Odessa and Monahans and never returned to Howard (o., Missouri.

The Rennolds Family

Again I am taking this information from the "Rennolds Family Genealogy" book by Hazel Rennolds Sanders to whom I am eternally grateful, otherwise I probably would never have been able to have gotten all the information on the

Rennolds and Andrews families.

The history begins with our earliest known ancestor in England and follows a record beginning with Christopher Rennolds. In order to shorter what I am writing, a number of later relatives will be omitted. The name Reynolds, also spelled in America as Runnels, Runals, etc. is of Norman origin and comes from the family of Renard. The family is of great antiquity, claiming descent from Reynolds son of Grethferth - The Dane - King of Northumberland. Grethferth and his two sons were driven from England circa 944 and took shelter in Normandy. His descendants Fitzreynolds, meaning son of, returned to England with William The Conquenor".

"Christopher Reynolds the first known of the family was born circa 1530 in (ounty Kent, England. He married and settled in London, where he and his sons engaged in trade and commerce. Records indicate that he had a brother-Nathaniel Reynolds - also engaged with his company. The names of the children of Christopher and his wife are not known completely. His known or identifiable issue are not necessarily listed in order of birth. (hildren are George, Christopher, Mary who died young, John, Thomas, Connelius, Richard

b. circa 1575, Robert, William and several daughters."

George Reynolds was born 1555, County Kent, England, d. 1634 London, England. m. 20 Jan. 1585 Thomasyn Church. Their children settled in Virginia and the New England States. Children are:

Elizabeth Ann Meredith was a granddaughter of John Andrews Jr. and a neice of Samuel Andrews. Her mother was Martha "Patsy" Andrews, a daughter of John Andrews Jr. To this union 11 children were born in Howard and Saline (ounties, Mo. We will only be concerned with Luther Rennolds, the 9th child and 5th son of John Thomas and Elizabeth Ann Rennolds.

Luther Rennolds b. 7 Dec. 1880 Howard (ounty, Mo., d. 1 Jan. 1942 Dexter, Stoddard (ounty, Mo. M. Elizabeth May Dry 14 Dec. 1901 Lakenan, Mo. Elizabeth May b. 24 July 1881 Monroe (ounty, Mo. She d. 16 July 1959 Shelbina, Mo. Sometime after her husband Luther died, Elizabeth May Rennolds married Frank McCluskey 15 Apr. 1950 in Detroit, Mich. Frank McCluskey was b. 24 Aug. 1884. He was a twin. No children were born to this marriage. Luther and Elizabeth May Dry Rennolds were the parents of 3 children.

Rennolds and Mariah Wills. He was born 1 Oct. 1821, Fayette (ounty, Ky., d. 1 Apr. 1902 near Harrisburg, Boone (ounty, Mo. He is buried in New Hope Cemetary about ten miles northeast of Fayette, Howard (ounty, Mo. The grave is unmarked. He married Tarza Winn 18 Aug. 1841 at the age of 20 years. She was b. 15 Oct. 1823 Howard (ounty, Mo., d. 18 May 1853 Howard (ounty, Mo. at the age of 30 years. Richard Lindsay was also the brother of Sarah Ellen Rennolds Lessley. She was b. 11 Dec. 1831 Howard (o., No., d. 22 Jan. 1917 and is buried in New Hope (emetary. Her parents were Johnson and Sophia Wainscott Walker. To this union 14 children were born. Altogether he had 17 children. Richard Rennolds was a (ivil War veteran. He served as a private in (o. W.W. Harris Regiment, Howard (ounty, No. Militia. He enlisted 18 Mar. 1865 and was honorably discharged at Fayette, No. 12 Aug. 1865. He was 44 years old when he joined the Army. His application for a pension was No. 1199150 and it was never granted.

Then on 7 Apr. 1829 for his second wife, he married Mary Winn Tribble of Boone County, Mo. She was born 22 Jan. 1806 Clark County, Ky., d. 6 Apr. 1888 Parkville, Platte County, Mo. Her first husband was Samuel Tribble m. 22 Nov. 1823. He only lived eight months after marriage. In 1842 Thomas and his wife Mary Winn moved to Platte County. To this union 7 children were born.

Thomas (. Rennolds and his wife Mariah Wills are our great-great-grand-parents. The other Reynolds or Rennolds you have read about previously are our forebears. When he and his wife Mary Winn moved to Platte (ounty in 1842, it is not known who took care of his children by his first wife. His son Richard Lindsay was already married. Sarah Ellen was 19 years old, John M. was 17 years old and Elizabeth was 16 years of age. In all probability it



On 27 Oct. 1919 his wife Elizabeth Ann Neredith Rennolds applied for a widow's pension and it was granted. John T.

served in the Union armed forces from 1 Apr. 1862 to 25 July 1865.

"His wife Elizabeth Ann was a little thing" so wnote one of her daughters Elizabeth Ellen Long. "I can remember her standing under her husband's arms when he stretched them out. He was 6'2" tall. She weighed less than 100 lbs. all her life". John Thomas moved a lot from county to county during his early married life. He was in Saline (ounty a number of times but finally in 1887, they moved to Lakenan, Sheiby (ounty, Mo., and settled there permanently.





In a letter to the Torchlight, E. B. Rennolds writing from Harrisburg, Boone county, Mo., tells of the death of his father, R. L. Rennolds, who died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Susan Long, near Harrisburg April 1st. Mr. Rennolds was born in Fayette county, Ky.; in 1821 and came to Missouri with his father in 1826. He married Liza J. Walker in 1853, and to the union were born fourteen children. He had forty-six grandchildren and twenty great grandchildren.

The wife and seven children survive to mourn his departure. Mr. Rennolds lived at Lakenan, this county for a time, leaving there about a year ago. John, a son still lives near Lakenan.

Mr. Rennolds was a good man, a consistent member of the Old School Baptist church and had a large circle of friends.

Richard Lindsay Rennolds served in the Civil War as a private in company of W. W. Harris Regiment, Howard County, Missouri, Militia. He enlisted March 18, 1865, and honorably discharged at Fayette, Missouri, on 12th day of August 1865. He made application for a pension 2 October 1897. His pension application No. 1199150.

NOTE: In 1962, I made a trip to Harrisburg, Missouri to see Ray Long, a grandson of Richard Lindsay Rennolds. I copied the following from an old scrapbook that had belonged to Susan Rennolds Long Dennis, a daughter of Richard Lindsay Rennolds by his second marriage. The name of the newspaper had been cut away. Evidently it was a 1902 edition of a Howard, Boon or Randolph County paper. The scrapbook is now in the possession of Ray Long, Harrisburg, Boone County, Missouri.

"Died at Harrisburg, Missouri, April 2, 1902, at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Long, Lindsay Rennolds, age 77 years. The remains were buried at New Hope Church, Howard County, Missouri. Wednesday News."

January 24, 1962, the following letter was received from Mrs. Ben Louise O'Dell, Moberly, Missouri; her father was George Richard Rennolds, a prominent pioneer citizen of Higbee, Missouri, and a first cousin of Richard Lindsey Rennolds. She gives an interesting first hand account of Richard Lindsey Rennolds. (See pg. 78 for obituary of George Richard Rennolds.)

"My dear Mrs. Sanders.

Since seeing your papers I remember Mr. Richard Lindsey Rennolds. But not by that name. He was known among relatives and all the community as 'Uncle Bunkum'. How he acquired this Nom-de-Plume I do not know, but his lap was a nice place for a small girl to rest. That I remember quite distinctly. He seemed to be my idea of a perfect grandfather. My own grandparents on both sides died long before I arrived.

My memory of him and 'Aunt Liza' is rather dim, but their daughter, Mrs. Susan Long, lived in Higbee during my girl-hood and she was often in our home. A handsome woman and such a nice person. She and my father often talked of their kinship - I believe about fourth cousins.

You are mistaken in the identity of my family. My grandfather was John Calhoun Rennolds. He had only one wife Ann Quisenberry Rennolds. She was married at age thirteen and had thirteen children. She died at 54. What a life!' My father was the youngest of that brood.

I do not have the dates of birth or death of any of my father's family. Most of the aunts and uncles were gone before my time and I know so few of the cousins.

My father loved people and kept in touch with many relatives. There have been several different branches of the Rennolds family in Randolph County. He claimed them all as blood kin.

I am happy to tell you the Rennolds I have known were nice people. Rather above average I think, and I am proud to be one of the clan.

I do wish I could be more help to your quest for information. Are you getting records for the D. A. R.?

With personal good wishes to you and in your interesting research.

Mrs. Reynolds was born in Howard County, Mo., and was married to John Thomas Reynolds in 1862. She had lived in the Lakenan community for forty-four years. The husband preceded her in death a number of years ago, also four children of eleven born to their union have passed on. She is survived by five daughters and two sons; Mrs. Bettie Long, with whom she lived; Mrs. Lou Heath, Marshall, Mo.; Mrs. Press Love, Macon; Mrs. Ed Myers, Blandinsville, Ill.; Mrs. Walter Stearns, Broken Arrow, Okla.; Walter Reynolds, Centralta, Ill., and Luther Reynolds, Dexter, Mo. She also leaves one brother, Charles Meredith, near Hunnewell. All of her children and a number of her grandchildren were at her bedside before she passed away.

Funeral services were held from the Methodist church in Lakenan Monday morning at Il o'clock, conducted by the Rev. Ed Simmons of Shelbina. Burial was in Kendall cemetery."

George Rennolds Drops Dead.

George W. Rennolds, aged 46 years, and a farmer living near the Tiefore Bridge north of Lakenan, dropped dead at the home of Peter Reardon, of the same vicinity, at about 9:30 o'clock Monday evening, September 15.

Mr. Rennolds had gone to the home of Mr. Reardon for the purpose of sitting up with a sick child. In the room with him at the time of his death were Mr. and Mrs. Tom Greening who were there to inquire as to the condition of the sick child. Mr. Rennolds was standing in the room when he was suddenly stricken and fell to the floor. He was picked up almost immediately, carried to an adjourning room and placed on a bed, after which he only breathed once or twice.

Coroner Charles Chapman was sent for and he, together with Drs. Vaughn and Battersby in the presence of a coroner's jury conducted an autopsy which revealed nothing wrong, every organ seemingly being in a healthy condition, and the verdict of the jury was that death resulted from unknown causes.

George Washington Rennolds was a son of Mr. and Mrs. John T. Rennolds of near Lakenan. He was born in Howard County, Mo., October 22, 1866, died September 15, 1913, aged 46 years, 11 months and 7 days.

He was united in marriage to Sarah Chapman, September 23, 1890, and who died September 17, 1908 -- five years and two days previous. To this union were born eight children, one dying in infancy. Those living are: Mrs. Dollie Greening, Willie V., Elsie, Ada, Molder and Paul Rennolds, all of near Lakenan.

Deceased had been both a father and mother to these children as near as possible since the death of their mother. He united with the Christian Church seven years ago and was true to his faith.

Funeral services were held at home Wednesday at 1 PM conducted by Rev. B. H. Cleaver of this city. Burial at Kendall.
